

Jerry Adams Enters Team In Tourney

Grapplers Engage Elite Of Midwest In Inaugural Match of 1942 Season

Mentor Jerry Adam, Cornhusker wrestling tutor, waved his wand yesterday afternoon and selected nine grappling proteges to represent Nebraska in the Midwest wrestling tourney at Ames, Ia. Mentor Adam and his squad will leave tomorrow afternoon.

Huskies Untried.
Husker chances of victory are uncertain. The Scarlet and Cream man-benders have yet to perform and even Coach Adam isn't certain what they'll do. Tony Nocita will battle in the 128-pound division. Veterans Newt Copple and George Cogle are 145-pound entries while Ed Copple and Ken Husemoller will invade the 155-pound division. Bob Poe and Dick Smith, 165-pounders, and Nick Douvas, 175-pound newcomer, will wrestle in the heavier divisions. Herb Jackman is Adam's top heavyweight wrestler.

Seven teams are entered in the meet which is designed to permit college wrestling coaches to test candidates in strong competition. Instead of giving titles, the officials will keep only the 'won and lost' records of individual performers.

A two-day affair, the meet will start Friday at 2 and 7 p. m. Finals will be held Saturday at 10 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. The wrestlers are slated to weigh in Friday morning at 10 a. m.

While Big Six dons are fighting it out verbally in what may prove to be one of the roughest battles in the history of conference athletics—the case of the University of Oklahoma and Gerald Tucker vs. Kansas State university—league teams have been mopping up in non-conference cage battles.

With the records of Iowa State and K. U. as yet unblemished, Big Six teams have won 19 of 34 non-conference games. In the first ten games played by league teams, no conference team was defeated, with the record of the six teams before vacation standing at 14 wins in 16 starts.

Vacation Period Scores.

Over the vacation period, with most of the teams on the road and coaches substituting untried players in preparation for the con-

ference opening last night, Big Six teams were victorious in only five games in 18 starts.

Offensive leaders to date have been last year's two top teams, K. U. and Iowa State with averages of 49.5 and 47.8 points per game respectively, while each team has held their opponents to an average of 31 points per game.

Cyclones Boast Record.

Staying for the most part close to home the undefeated Cyclones have chalked up victories over Coe, Drake, Bradley Tech, Grinnell and Drake, while second-place Kansas, with only two games behind them, have defeated Denver U. and Bethel.

Kansas State, in the third-place slot, is credited with wins over Colorado State (2), Doane, Washburn, and Montana U., while the Wildcats have lost to Washington U., Washington State and Montana State.

Tigers Split.

Playing one game close to home and five intersectionally, Missouri's Tiger cagers have dropped
