Would Dismiss Some.

Theo Cohn, "If they don't give Friday's classes off, they could at least dismiss the afternoon and Saturday morning classes. The present curtailment of class work is fine and fits in with the defense movement, but it would certainly be convenient to have a day off."

Jo Arvenette, "I don't think we should be made to go to school on Good Friday. A lot of us have church affiliations that we must attend and school on Good Friday has just never been done before."

Jerry White, "They might as well not have school on Good Friday because I won't be there anyway, especially if it's as good a day as this. I don't think many others will attend classes either. They will either be starting out for home or starting out for parts unknown."

Mary Allen, "It seems to me that school should be dismissed to let students with great distances to travel more time to go to their homes. For myself, I'll have to attend church on that day, and school will interfere there."
