Fourteen Hoosier Veterans Will Face Huskers Saturday

Husker gridmen again went about their tasks seriously yesterday, realizing that Saturday's task is cut out for them. Top task is to "stop Hillenbrand" with his mates second in importance.

Husker fans haven't yet forgotten the 1941 Hoosier fray wherein Master Hillenbrand, aided by diminutive Chuck Jacoby, surprised the Cornhuskers, 21-13. It won't be a surprise this term. Hillenbrand and Jacoby are back, plus a raft of capable sophomores and 1941 lettermen.

A majority of the drill yesterday went to tightening the Husker pass defense. Big Howard Debus was tossing strikes at the third team while the first team took the defense against Indiana plays used by the frosh club. Debus was tossing with fiery accuracy, indicating Nebraska may have an aerial say of its own.

Ki Eisenhart with a sore knee, Fred Metheny recovering from a chest cold, and Wally Hopp missed over half of the drill.

Mentor Presnell can field a dozen men who saw action against the Hoosiers a year ago. Bo McMillin has fourteen gridsters back who saw action a year ago. Indiana's forward wall outweighs the Scarlet line, 201 pounds to 193. Backfield average also favors the Hoosiers, 188-184.

Captain to Lead Eleven Saturday

If there is one individual on the Husker team that the Hoosiers will be watching Saturday it is sure to be Allen Zikmund.

During his collegiate football career "Zik" has played against the Indians twice—scoring touchdowns in both contests. Two years ago he took a pass from Harry Hopp for the touchdown which gave Nebraska a 13-7 victory. Last year on a short reverse he ran 36 yards to give the Huskers a 6-0 lead, but the Big Ten representatives won 21-13.

In naming Zikmund, game captain for Saturday's game, Coach Presnell had in mind "Zik's" success against Indiana.

Silver-thatched Ol' Bo McMillin of Praying Colonel fame isn't crying over the fortunes of his "po' little boys" this term. Press gentry over the domain agree vehemently that if O' Bo did loosen his tear ducts, nothing but pure crocodile particles of saline would pour out.

That grey-haired old Hoosier daddy with the youthful zip no longer leans on yon weeping wall. Tops last year, Bo's offense boasts even heavier artillery this term.

"We will be stronger than we were a year ago," says Bo, without qualifying phrases. "Indiana will have the strongest backfield in her history," he says. "We have a promising sophomore or two to add to the junior trio of Bill Hillenbrand, Lou Saban, and Chuck Jacoby."

Another Tommy Harmon in-the-making, according to justly proud Bloomington partisans, is sweeping through his paces this week in preparation for his Saturday stand against the Huskers.

All Billy Hillenbrand did as a sophomore last year was spin to seven touchdowns, play more than 31 quarters out of a possible 32, account for 1,615 yards in all-route gains, pass for seven touchdowns, earn All-American rating on three teams (as a soph!) and rated "player of the Big Ten season."

We now quote an item from the Hoosier house organ: "Hillenbrand has shown in practice that he will be even more potent."

In the supporting cast for Hillenbrand Productions we have Chuck Jacoby, a stellar pass-snatcher and pass defender. Opposing aerial specialists failed last year to complete one pass over Jacoby's territory.

Capt. Bob White bucked his way a 5.4 average in 71 attempts last year as a Hoosier fullback. Signal-barker Lou Saban, described by Bo as "tougher than pig iron from bumper to bumper" is back for more bone-crusing blocks.

Bo continues: "We have one pair of fine ends. Our guards are green but they have fine physical equipment to play that rugged position. John Bochnicka, Howard Brown, Francis Linonis and Joe Zuzga are sophomores who have a lot of speed for boys over 185."

"Bochnicka should be a great guard—195 pounds and can run like a halfback. The joker is, however, he never played any football but even at that I have high hopes for him." Bochnicka at the moment is Indiana's third ranking guard.

Wade Benched With Injured Knee Tuesday

COLUMBIA, Mo., Oct. 7.—Missouri—intensely drilling for Saturday's battle with the powerful Wisconsin Badgers—suffered a severe blow, Tuesday, when their star air bombardier, Red Wade, was sidelined with an ailing knee.

Coach Don Faurot ordered the fire-haired star to skip the next few days of action and indicated that he would not use him against the Badgers. Wade has been out with an injury for over a week and Tuesday's insertion into the lineup was shortlived.
