Gas Ration Registration Today, Friday

Car Owners Register At Elementary Schools Between 3 and 7 P.M.

University students driving cars have two days left in which to register for gasoline rationing cards, with registration lasting today and tomorrow from 3 to 7 p. m. in elementary schools only.

Application blanks, secured from any service station, along with car registration certificate must be presented at the school. All application blanks must carry serial numbers of tires and signature of the person in whose name the car is registered at county court houses in the owner's home county.

Applicants will be given an "A" ration book and a book of instructions. If entitled to additional gas, applicant may obtain another blank to be filed with ration board.

Registration for motorcycle owners only will be held at the public school administration building, 2215 Randolph, where "D" rationing books will be issued.

Michigan Prof Speaks At Meeting in Avery Lab at 7:30 Tonight

Speaking before the Nebraska section of the American Chemical association, Professor F. F. Blicke of the University of Michigan will talk on the "Development of Synthetic Local Anesthetics." The meeting will take place at 7:30 p. m. in Avery lab tonight.

Dr. Blicke at the present time is Professor of Pharmaceutical Chemistry at Michigan. Having studied in many American and European universities, Dr. Blicke has written many articles regarding pharmaceutical chemistry.

Pre-medical and pharmacy students are extended a special invitation to attend the meeting. Preceding the lecture will be a dinner at 6:00 o'clock in Parlor Z at the Student Union. Asst. Professor of Chemistry Norman Cromwell, secretary of the society, has charge of the meeting.

Replacing 75's . . . ROTC Field Artillery Unit To Use 105 mm. Howitzers . . . Beginning Today

Eight new 105 millimeter howitzers now replace the World War I 75 millimeter guns at the field artillery R. O. T. C. unit on ag campus. The new pieces arrived Monday and will be ready for use

howitzers. Still in good firing condition, the 75's are to be used by army tank destroyer units, and may possibly see service in the present war.

Cornhusker field artillery has distinction of being the first R. O. T. C. unit in the 7th Service Command supplied with howitzers.

The 105 mm. howitzer is the type now being used in the field to cover and support infantry troops. Twenty feet in length, weighing two tons, it is modern in every detail, is more accurate, and can be fired through greater angles than the old "75's."

Greatest feature, from the viewpoint of students, is the panoramic sighting device. Built on the order of a telescope, the new sights facilitate easier and more accurate aiming.
