UN Cagers Tip Hawks, 52-43 **Ace Gets 23 Points** Heinzelman Leads Mates

BY GENE SHERMAN. took Nebraska's inspired Huskers ten minutes to start clicking, but once the bad basketball was out of their system there was no stopping the Lewandowskimen as they ran up a 52-43 win over the previously undefeated Univer-sity of Iowa Hawkeyes last night. It was Nebraska's first win of the Seao .2

With the Huskers trailing 10-4 at the end of ten minutes of the first half, Bob Heinzelman took matters into his own hands and proceeded to tally 16 points before the half time gong sounded. Seven markers during the last period gave "Heinz" a total of 23 for the evening.

Heinzelman started his hot streak by sinking three quick baskets to bring the locals within one point of the Iowans. Chapman, Iowa's high point man, then ex-tended the visitors' lead to 15-12 with two good shots. Heinzelman again found the hoop for two baskets to whittle the Hawks' lead to 15-14. With the Iowans still leadings 20-17, Heinzelman kept his torrid streak intact by dumping in three more shots to give Nebraska their first lead of the ball game 21-20. A tip-in by Ben Trickey gave Iowa the lead at half time 22-21.

Huskers Pull Away. Nebraska opened the second half with Max Young, Ken Elson, and Heinzelman scoring to give which the Huskers a 27-22 lead they never relinquished. From then on the Big Ten team couldn't keep up with the inspired Huskers.

Second half play found Kenny Elson, Max Young, and John Bott-orf too much for the surprised Hawks. Elson tallied all of his
