Foundation Concludes 1st Year, Files Incorporation Papers

The Nebraska Student Foundation recently concluded its first year of activity as a campus organization by filing papers for incorporation, under the laws of the state of Nebraska. The Student Foundation is now approximately one year old, having been founded by the university Student Council in the spring of 1942.

Nearly 100 different students work in the organization in one respect or another. These students, acting as an organization, have undertaken a great number of different projects designed to promote the university throughout the state.

One of the greatest channels for promotion of the university is through the high schools which were kept in close contact with the university through the entire year. Campus tours for high school sneak day visitors, entertainment for campus-visiting high school tournament teams, essay contests open to high school seniors, with tuition-paid prizes, and the sending of copies of the yearbook and various issues of the Daily Nebraskan to selected high schools throughout the state, were included in the Foundation's activities for the year.

With the contributions from various departments of the cam-

pus, window displays were set up in various cities in the state, showing the various achievements of university departments. A pamphlet, entitled "The University on the Offense," written by George Blackstone, was published by the Foundation and mailed to members of the legislature of the state, and leading state officials and civic leaders.

The university as a whole has received co-operation from the Foundation, both as a service organization to the faculty and as one promoting publicity. Taking charge of the mailing of the secretary's page of the "Alumnus" throughout the entire state, the Foundation also acquaints other schools with the university by supplying pictures of our college life to the Collegiate Digest, a widely circulated collegiate weekly picture section.

War Scholarship Fund.

Planning for the future, the Student Foundation has created the War Scholarship fund which will enable certain selected veterans of the present war to enter school with tuition paid. The fund is to be placed in the hands of a faculty committee, which will grant \$50 scholarships to returning students whose abilities and grades meet requirements. The donations acquired are used to purchase war bonds which at the present time amount to \$2,100, a figure not far from the \$2,500 goal for this year.

One of the things done by the Foundation is the inculcating of spirit of duty to the university among those who have served on the organization. This alone, will be of immeasurable value to the university in years to come.
