Alcove Book Notes

"Fire Drake" by A. D. Divine is the story of a British destroyer which refused to give up. The Fire Drake, whose name means fiery dragon, was a member of the Eighth Flotilla. She steamed a million miles in two years. As the author was assigned to the Fire Drake as a naval correspondent, his account is based partly on the ship's log and partly on personal experience.

The book is illustrated with official photographs. The story which it tells is a record of hair-breadth escapes from the first to the last. Fire Drake, a tough and lucky ship, was in on everything from running battles in convoy duty to the exciting work on the Norwegian coast, from the placid Mediterranean to the grim Arctic.

Erna Ferguson's latest book, "Chile," shows us why Chile is the country she is today, why our relations with her are crucial, and what we can do to strengthen our ties with this important country. Miss Ferguson emphasizes the dramatic importance of this queer piece of land, 1,660 miles from tip to tip and scarcely more than 100 miles wide at her widest point.

Chile is one of the oldest and most picturesque countries of South America. Her conquest and settlement antedate Plymouth Rock by nearly a century. Her cul-

ture, originally Spanish, has been enriched with that of the proud unconquered Araucanian Indians.

Contrasts in Chile.

She is also a land of contrasts with her coastal deserts, fertile valleys, rain-soaked forests, towering Andes, miserable poverty and extreme wealth. Miss Ferguson has contributed to the understanding of the people themselves as she introduces her readers to scores of Chileans, one by one.

She has devoted a chapter to the poet Gabriela Mistral, a notable Latin American writer. "Chile" is a composite picture of the country with its farms, mines, rodeos, schools, churches, and views of

living conditions and social life, and the people themselves.
