She steamed a million failes in two years. As the author was assigned to the Firedrake as a naval correspondent, his account is based partly on the ship's log and partly on personal experience.

Firedrake, a tough and lucky ship, was in on everything from running battles in convoy duty to the exciting work on the Norwegian coast, from the placid Mediterranean to the gaim Arctic.
