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## No More Arrows...

Last night, on recommendation thru a letter to the Nebraskan from Kurt Porjesz, former UN student now in the army, War Council took action on the question of allowing returning service men and women to attend, free of charge, all university functions now open to the student body.

According to the plan, all university departments will cooperate in offering as many facilities as possible to the new program, with dances, variety shows and sports events leading the list of "things-to-do."

War Council has received criticism because of its failure to promote activities purely for the benefit of service groups, instead of holding dances and other affairs to enlarge its own funds. This new plan, surely, will be another target at which to shoot arrows labeled "unworthy."

But despite former criticisms, it will be hard to condemn the new plan. Suggested by a soldier, it seems to indicate just what the soldiers want from the university and the War Council. They ask for, and will receive, passes to the social events. They do not ask for something "worthy." They want entertainment; they like to read student publications; they enjoy an illusion of being back in school.

The War Council is serving its purpose when it gives service men and women what they ask. Until they ask something different, the current plans are the best on the market.

## Examination Schedule

Laboratory class meeting for several continuous hours on one or two days shall meet for examinations as follows: Classes meeting on Monday and Tuesday shall be examined on the date scheduled for the first hour of their laboratory meeting; Wednesday or Thursday classes on the second hour of their meeting; Friday or Saturday classes on the third hour.

Unit examinations have been scheduled for all sections in the following subjects: (1) Business Organization 3 and 4; (2) Chemistry 1 and 3; (3) Civil Engineering 1; (4) Education 30 and 63; (5) English 1, 2, 3, 4, 11, 27; (6) French 11 and 13; (7) Home Economics 41 and 42; (8) Mathematics 11, 12, 13, 21, 22, 41, 101, 104; (9) Mechanical Engineering 1; (10) Psychology 70; (11) Spanish 51 and 53. If students have regularly scheduled examinations conflicting with the above specially arranged schedule, arrangements to take such specially scheduled examinations at another time should be made with the department concerned on or before January 17. For example: If a student is scheduled for an examination which conflicts with a specially scheduled examination in French, arrangements should be made with the French department to take such examination at another time.
