

Lt. Jack Gavin Dies in Battle

Lt. Jack Gavin, '36, was killed in action Sept. 19 in the invasion of Holland, according to a war department telegram received recently by his mother.

Lieutenant Gavin is a graduate of UN, where he was affiliated with Phi Kappa Psi. He enlisted in the army in September, 1942, and went overseas in April, 1943.

ing the Arctic port of Kirkenes and 30 other communities to relieve German pressure on the Murmansk supply route. Stalin declared the Russians are going to drive straight thru Norway.

Most of the action on the western front in Europe has been in Holland, where the British Second army battled thru sHertogenbosch toward Tilburg.

Ball Supports Roosevelt.

After listening to both Dewey and Roosevelt expound their views on U.S. participation in an international organization last week, Senator Joseph E. Ball, leader of the internationalists

since Willkie's death, announced his support of President Roosevelt in the 1944 election. Ball's announcement followed similar decisions by Walter Lippmann, Russell Davenport, and the New York Times.

Stirred by the swing toward Roosevelt, Dewey Wednesday discarded his farm speech and, facing foreign policy as the most immediate problem, stated that U.S. participation "must not be subject to a reservation that would require our representative to return to congress for authority every time he had to make a decision." He qualified this statement by saying: "Obviously congress, and only congress, has the constitutional power to determine what quota of force it will make available, and what discretion it will give our representative to use that force."
