**Chicago Chemist Speaks to UN Chemistry Group**

Dr. Earl A. Evans, jr., professor and chairman of the department of bio-chemistry at the University of Chicago, will speak on "Carbon Fixation in Animal Tissues" at the 207th meeting of the American Chemical Society, Wednesday evening, Nov. 8. The meeting will begin at 7:30 in Room 208 of Avery Laboratory.

Dr. Evans received his B.Sc. degree in chemistry from Johns Hopkins University in 1931 and the degree of Ph. D. in Biochemistry from Columbia University in

1936. In 1939-40 he worked as a Fellow of the Rockefeller Foundation in the laboratory of Dr. Hans Krebs in Sheffield, England where he began his work on carbohydrate metabolism. Since his return from England, Dr. Evans has worked on various aspects of carbohydrate metabolism, particularly on carbon dioxide fixation by animal tissues, the effect of insulin, and the mechanism of carbohydrate oxidation.

In 1942 he received the Eli Lilly Research Award of the American Chemical Society for his work on carbon dioxide fixation by animal tissues. Dr. Evans is an honorary member of the Harvey Society of the New York Academy of Medicine and has been a Harvey lecturer during 1944.
