Two-Hour Discussion.

The reference committee, composed of two delegates each from United tSates, Russia, Great Britain, and one delegate from China, heard a two-hour discussion of an amendment offered by the small nations and one offered by the United States.

The proposal which will be submitted to the plenary session is:

"IV. Voting in the Security Council (Chap. VI, Sec. C)

"2. For a period of five years it shall be the rule that punitive measures may be invoked only by a two-thirds (7) vote of the se-curity council, including the unanimous vote of the permanent members, with the accused state being deprived at the time of the right to vote.

"3. In no case shall military sanctions be invoked until economic sanctions have been tried and proved inadequate.

"4. After a period of 5 years a general conference shall be held and the question of renewing
