Seventy-five dollars were also presented to the air base hospital to buy a record player and records for the wards. Letters were sent out to all houses this week requesting donations of records, stated Alice Able, president. Replies must be in Saturday.

Contributions to the clothing drive must be placed in boxes in the houses by Saturday, May 19, when they will be picked up. They will go to British war relief.

The veterans scholarship fund was set up in 1942 under the auspices of the student foundation. Its purpose is to serve as an extension of the GI bill of rights program which does not cover the full four years of a college career. Including the war council donation, it now totals \$2,050.

Dr. H. G. Holck, UN Professor, Writes Articles

Dr. H. G. O. Holck, associate professor of pharmacology at the University of Nebraska, has written two articles recently for pharmaceutical journals.

One article, "A Defense of Bioassay as a Required Subject in the Pharmaceutical Curriculum," was printed in the "American Journal of Pharmaceutical Education." The other is entitled "On the Influence of Several Anesthetics on the Fatal Dose of Digitalis in Cats and Frogs." Digitalis is a cardiac remedy and is secured from the dried leaves of purple fox-glove, a common garden plant. The article is based on studies Dr. Holck is making with the drug.
