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Peggy Bacon, Yasuo Kuniyoshi Show Original Prints in Exhibit

Peggy Bacon and Yasuo Kuniyoshi, artists whose works have been shown in Nebraska Art association exhibitions and several purchased for permanent collections, are now represented in a showing of original black and white prints in Galley B of Morrill Hall, until April 29.

Miss Bacon's "Winter Sport" is in the Hall collection and her "Allure" in the Gregg collection. She is best known for her etchings as shown now in Morrill Hall but she has also done book illustrating, drawings and pastels. She illustrated the best seller, "With Malice Toward Some."

Hall Collection.

This year's Nebraska Art association exhibition included her, "A Desperate Character." The Hall collection contains a picture of Miss Bacon called "Peggy Bacon and Metaphysics" by her former husband, Alexander Brooks.

"Aesthetic Pleasure," "Summer Folks," "Happy Holiday" are some of Miss Bacon's etchings in the current exhibition. Portraying all phases of life, the etchings are satirical and often are caricatures of certain types of people.

Yasuo Kuniyoshi, whose lithographs are exhibited, won first place in the Carnegie National and Pennsylvania Academy exhibitions with his "Spanish Soprano," purchased for the Hall collection two years ago. His "Room 110" was purchased last

year. In addition to his specialization in still life, he also does landscapes, animals, groups of figures and portraits.

Some of his lithographs now hanging on the south and east walls of Gallery B are "Circus Performer," "Pretzels," "Free Lodging," "Two Acrobats" and "Bull Fight." They date back until 1926 and show the various phases of Kuniyoshi's art endeavors.

"This exhibition of the lithographs of Kuniyoshi and etchings of Peggy Bacon is an excellent tie up with this year's past Nebraska Art association exhibitions," according to Prof. Dwight Kirsch, head of the art department. For comparison the works of the two artists which the permanent collections contain will be hung adjoining the current show.
