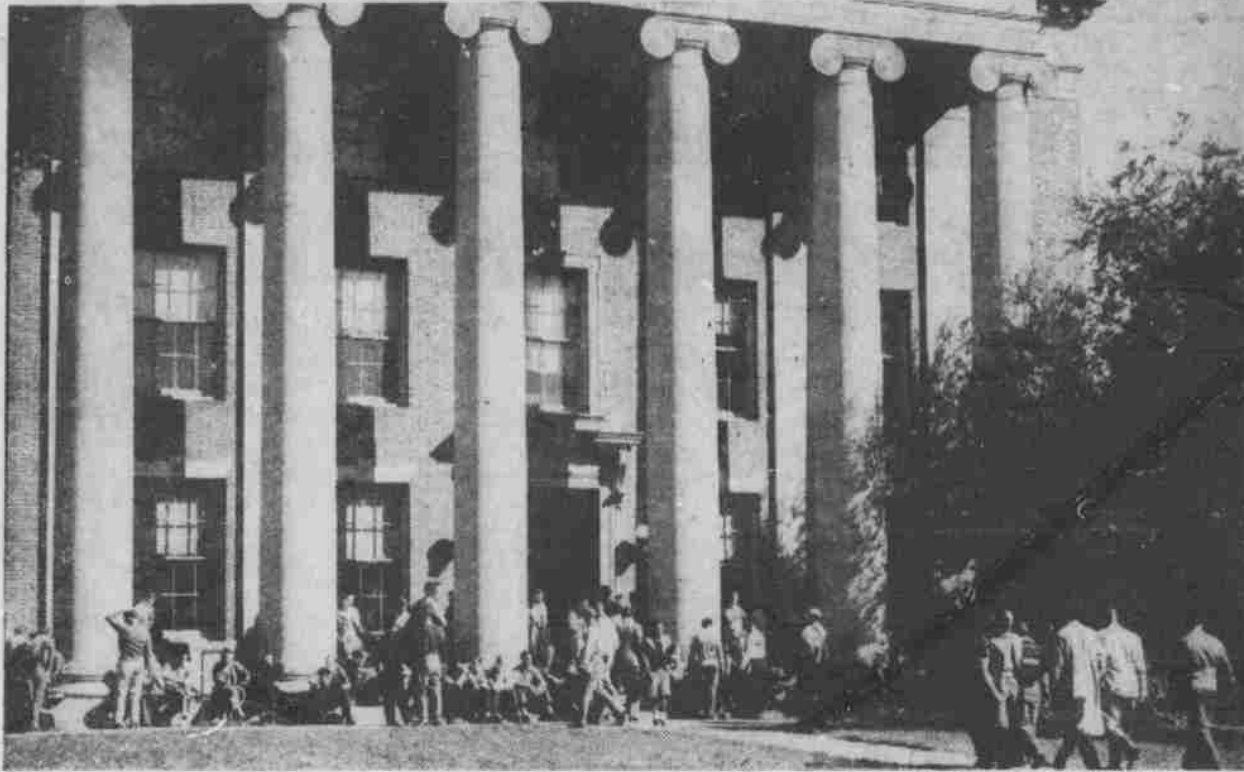

C; (c) three C activities; (d) one B activity and two C activities.

The old system included the following combinations of activities: (a) one A activity, one B, and one C; (b) two B activities and two C; (c) three B activities; (d) one B activity and three C activities; (e) four C activities.

A, B, Activities.

This revision has been made to enable the presidents of the various campus organizations to plan for their future boards, and to modify them if it is found necessary to do so under this new point system. The AWS board will also make changes in the point value of each activity which will be announced at a later date.

"A" activities include: President of Ag YWCA, BABW, AWS, Coed Counselors, Home Ec club, Mortar Board, Student Council, Student Foundation, Tassels, WAA, YWCA, Director of AUF, editor or business manager of Cornhusker or Daily Nebraskan, governor of residence halls, and business manager of University Theater.

"B" activities include: President of ag executive board, Panhellenic, or organized house, ag or city YWCA cabinet member, AUF treasurer, board member of BABW, Coed Counselors, or AWS; Coed Counselor charm school or book review chairman, Cornhusker managing editor or assistant business manager, Home Ec club board member, Daily Nebraskan managing editor, sports editor, news editor, assistant business manager, organized house pledge trainer, member student council or Tassels, Student Foundation officer, or district chairman; WAA council member or YWCA commission leader.

The first evening classes of the current fall semester were held yesterday evening, with courses being offered in varying subjects according to K. O. Broady, extension division director.

Other classes will begin Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday evenings of this week. Despite the early beginning of classes, fees may be paid throughout September 30 without penalty, Broady stated.

A limited number of students who find it impossible to secure the daytime classes they desire may be accommodated in the evening school, according to Broady.

Among the courses scheduled are nearly 50 subjects that are introductory courses. Complete information regarding evening classes is available at the University Extension Division office, located at 202 Former Museum. Subjects not offered by the extension may be added when sufficient interest exists.
