He ends almost every recital with an exhibition of Handed improvising. several themes just a few minutes before he is to use them, Dupre weaves them into a new composition. Professor Myron Roberts has been collecting suggested themes from a number of Lincoln musicians which he will give to Mr. Dupre for his recital tomorrow evening.
