

Team statistics indicate that passes in eight games and 60 have been completed for a percentage of .357 and a gain of 775 yards.

Nebraska's gain on passes in six games amounts to 324 yards, the result of 23 completions in 70 at-

tempts for a .302 percentage. looking at the Iowa State record Aithough not against passes. quite as vulnerable as the Scarlet defenders, the Ames outfit has allowed opponents to com-plete more than half of the passes attempted for a gain of 683 yards. Cyclone foes have connected on 44 of 87 attempts for a .505 percentage, not far the Husker op- ing man there wasn't in uniform. ponents' record of 48 successes in 90 tries which produces a .533 mark. Two of the Nebraska passers, ference tossers Vacanti has completed 12 of 35 heaves for 229 yards, good for third place behind the Cyclones' Norman and Ray Evans of Kansas, while Metheny is in sixth position.


Dad's Day


