Twenty Games Billed for Ames Baseball Team

Ames, Ia.—Iowa State will play the longest baseball slate the Cyclones have had in many years with a total of 20 contests listed for the 1947 season.

Coach L. C. (Cap) Timm will send his squad into action for the first time against Iowa Teachers at Ames, April 4-5. The season will close at Manhattan in a set with Kansas State, May 26-27.

Included in the list will be 12 conference games, with all schools appearing on the schedule at least twice. Nebraska will face the Cyclones four times—all within six days.

Iowa State Tankmen Drop Scarlet Friday

Hollie Lepley's UN swimming team dropped their fourth meet this season and their second this week as the Iowa State Cyclones cut the waves to a 49-35 margin at the Coliseum pool.

Again Marvin Grimm, the Diller flash, proved the bright spot of the 'Husker contestants. He broke the eight year old pool record held by Adams of Iowa State in the 50 yard free style with the scintillating time of 24 seconds flat and just missed the 100 yard record by one tenth of a second.

Star of the Cyclone victors was Roger Watts who broke two pool records, in the 200 and 440 yard free style events. He came in over two lengths ahead of the nearest 'Husker competitor in the

latter, and his 2:17.5 in the 200 broke the five-day record of Iowa U.'s Hutinger, who eclipsed the old mark only last Monday.

Masterson Cheerful As Grid Drills Near

Coach Bernie Masterson is confident that the University of Nebraska will field an improved football team next fall.

All of the 1946 squad has at least one more year of eligibility. This, plus the enrollment of new talent at the second semester, is what Coach Masterson is basing his hopes on. Plus the fact this year he will have the entire group in spring drills which start March 10.

There is the chance that former Nebraska players who have been in service will return next fall in time to play.

Among the new additions are Charles Harrington of Auburn, a 175-pounder who was among the 10 leading pass receivers in the nation last fall when he played with Washington & Lee.

Charles Toogood, a 250-pounder from North Platte, and exceptionally fast for his size, will try for a tackle assignment.

Bob Mullen, from Connellsville, Pa., who played fullback for a service team overseas, is a protege of Clarence Herndon, former University of Nebraska tackle. Mullen is 6 feet 2 1/2, weighs 200 pounds.

Fred Golan, 6-1 and 215 pounds, played tackle with Northwestern in 1944 and had 20 months service with the Field Artillery. Golan played 58 minutes against Notre Dame as a member of the Northwestern team.

Bill Mueller, a seat back who played with Corpus Christi while in service, is another likely prospect who enrolled at mid-year.

Joe Brown, guard in basketball, may try for an end position. Bob Cerv, until a back injury suffered in basketball, had been thinking of reporting for the grid sport. If his back responds to treatment he may take a whirl at the grid sport.

John Gare of Northampton, Mass., who was here in AST, liked the west and decided to return here to school, is another tackle prospect. He played a year under Andy Kerr at Colgate.
