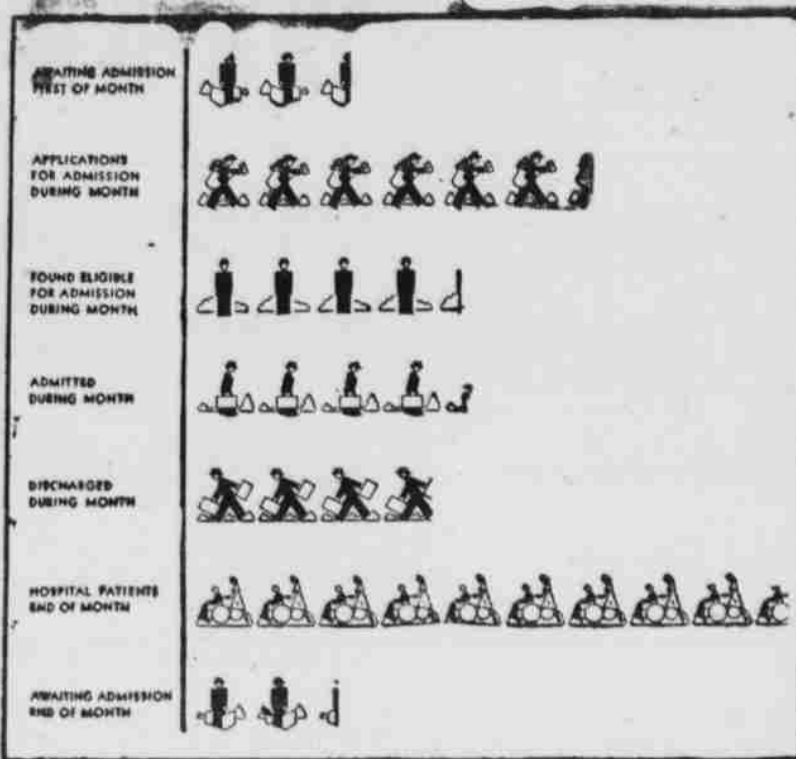

Drawings above show hospital activity during December, including a reduction of those awaiting admission from 24,500 to 22,000. Each figure represents 10,000 veterans.

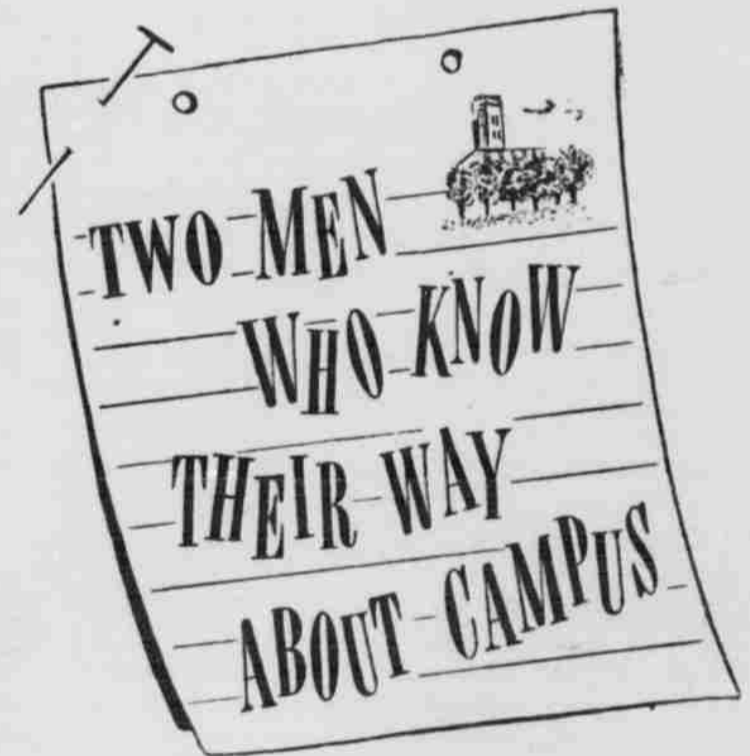
