Feeders' Day which is sponsored by the ammal husbandry department is instrumental in revealing experiments in breeding and feeding carried on at the college of agriculture in the past year. The traditional event is attended by persons throughout Nebraska and neighboring states who are inter-

ested in livestock breeding.
