**Thurlo McCrady**, new athletic director at Kansas State, has been unable to locate a house in Manhattan and as a result his wife and family are still living in Brookings. S. D. McCrady was the athletic boss and head football and basketball coach at South Dakota State before accepting the Wildcat offer.

A new position has been created in the Iowa State athletic family. Ray Donels, head football coach at the Ames school prior to the arrival of Mike Michalske, has been taken on as athletic contact man.

It will be Donel's job to contact athletes with the idea of inducing them to continue their studies at Iowa State. During the war Donels was the officer in charge of athletics at the Ottumwa Navy Base at Ottumwa, Iowa. His contacts there should serve him in good stead when he begins his recruiting drive.

Record crowds are the rule rather than the exception for Iowa State's baseball appearances. In three home games against Iowa State Teachers and Simpson, the Cyclones have attracted 3,586 fans.

Nebraska's league-leading Big Six nine played at Ames in a two game series, and the resulting throng must have set a new record at the Cyclone school. Previous high mark was 1,317 for the first game of the Iowa Teachers series.

Two members of the UCLA football team who were mighty important in the Uclan grid machine last fall have shifted their talents to the baseball diamond during the spring.

Just in case you forget, Nebraska will be in a position to feel the Gopher power, Minnesota will be the second Scarlet foe next fall, coming to Lincoln on October 4, a week after the Indiana curtain raiser which will also be played on Husker soil.

## Scarlet Nine Whales Ames Outfit by 12-3

AMES, Ia.—Nebraska right fielder Bob Cerv unleashed a terrific batting attack to catapult the visiting Cornhusker baseball team to a 12-3 win over the Iowa State Cyclones Monday afternoon in a Big Six contest.

Cerv, a basketball letterman at NU, connected for three home runs in four trips to the plate to spark a 13-hit Husker attack which routed Ralph Theobald, the Cyclone mound ace. Three runs in the first frame sent the Scarlet club into an early lead and the visitors were never in danger.

Elroy Gloystein, control expert from Utica, was on the hill for the Huskers. In racking up his third conference victory, Gloystein fanned seven and walked

four. Plus his pitching achievements, the Nebraska hurler slapped a home run in the fifth inning to further insure his victory margin.

**Scarlet in Front.**

The win sends Nebraska to the head of the loop baseball parade with a record of four wins and two defeats. Monday's contest was the first league game for the Cyclone nine.

Coach Tony Sharpe's Nebraska outfit was well fortified in the hitting department, for in addition to four home runs, Husker batters pounded out a triple and a double. Bill Denker, third baseman, hit the three-mast blow, while Shortstop Bob Grogan connected for a double.

Outfielder Fritz Hegwood kept up his hitting pace with two hits in four trips to the plate. Gloystein and his battery mate, Catcher Orv Schmieding also got two for four.

The teams played again at Ames Tuesday and will move to Lincoln for two more games, one Friday and one Saturday.
