One thing develops out of the smoke and confusion of the "Schuschnigg Affair." Herr Schuschnigg, fascist or not accomplished something that no one else has been able to do at Nebraska. He appealed to the interest of the student body sufficiently to get several thousand of them to take the trouble to go to a convocation,

After an all-university convocation which drew a pititful attendance of fifty, the Schuschnigg drawing-power is all the more remarkable. To have student interest force the convocation to be switched to the coliseum is practically unprecedented!

We don't believe that Dr. Schuschnigg's speech was actually that much more important than those of previous convocations. But the selection of such a controversial figure was an inspiration in the first place. And the interest of the history department in putting Schusch-nigg's background before the student body wa sequally comendable.

All in all, the incident was a refrshing reversal of the university's general inclination to shy away from any and all controversial questions. This former conservatism may have anticipated and prevented outside criticism. But such a head-in-the-sand attitude can only foster a sterile atmosphere in student minds.

No one, we suspect, joined the forces of Fascism, Communism or any other "ism" afer listening to Dr. Schuschnigg's talk. So perhaps the only real Fascist plot was forcing us to think of something more vital than coke dates. If so, we were taken in, and we liked it!
