Evans is the first Jayhawker ever to gain an All-America berth, "The greatest back I have ever seen," is what his coach, George Sauer, has to say about the stellar Evans. Evan's All-America backfield mates include Notre Dame's brilliant quarterback, Johnny Lujack; Bob Chappuis, running and passing star from Michigan, and Doak Walker, Southern Methodist whiz. 

Illini Coach Ray Eliot's colorful speech highlighted the annual University Club football banquet Tuesday night for the Cornhusker gridders.


Eliot talked to the grid squad and some 200 University Club members on what makes a win-
