

Nubbins Take Fifth Victory; Stop Concordia

Coach John Thompson's Nebraska University Nubbins captured their fifth win, Wednesday night, in the preliminary to the varsity game as they swamped Concordia College, 63-33.

Center Bob Allen led the Big cagers in the scoring column with 12 points. Doyle Busskohl and Bill Saler hit ten each to take runner-up honors. Nubbins. All ten of the players who saw action broke into the scoring column. Pohlmann was high for the visitors with 12 markers.

Coach Thompson's boys have previously defeated York B, Morningside B, Concordia and Western Union of LeMars, Iowa, while losing only to Morningside B.

The Cornhusker reserves will play two more games this season. They meet York B, March 1, and Western Union College, March 6. Both contests will be preliminary to varsity home games.

Husker Track Team Poised For K.C. Upset

The University of Nebraska track team, victorious in four out of five indoor dual meets, will be in position to provide a surprise at the Big Seven Conference indoor championships Saturday at Kansas City.

Although lacking depth to offset the power of the balanced University of Missouri, if the Tigers slip the Cornhuskers will be there ready to step in, Coach Ed Weir believes.

Don Cooper, defending pole vault champion, appears to be at top form, having cleared more than 14 feet on two occasions in competition. Cooper has scored 28 points in five meets to pace the Cornhuskers. His speed enabled him to pick off a second place in the 60-yard dash against the University of Kansas.

Other Nebraska point makers include Bob Berkshire, hurdler, 24 points; Loyal Hurlbert, 440 and 880, 22 1/2 points; Dick Piderit, shot put, 21; Jim Martin, 880, 18; Ray Magsamen, hurdler and high jumper, 17 1/3; Henry Schlueter, miler, 17; Bill Moomey, hurdler, 16; Don Morrison, 2-miler, 15.

UN Wrestlers Face Spartans In Dual Meet

The University of Nebraska wrestling team, winner in only two of nine meets, closes its dual meet season at Michigan State College Saturday night.

The Cornhuskers have defeated the University of Colorado (19-10) and Kansas State College (17-19) in the Big Seven Conference. They have lost to Cornell (14-1) College (0-28), Colorado State College (6-20), Iowa State Teachers (5-28), Iowa State College (14-16), University of Minnesota (12-14), University of Oklahoma (11-14), and Oklahoma A. & M. (3-25).

Bob (Peewee) Yambor, 121-pounder, leads Coach Buel R. Patterson's squad. Bob has four decisions and two falls to his credit in eight matches. He was decided by Minnesota's Lapin and Oklahoma A. & M.'s Bill Jernigan.

The return of Mike DiBiase, 1946 National A.A.U. champion, strengthens the heavyweight division. Mike injured his knee playing football last fall and has been out of action until early this month. In three starts Mike has earned two decisions, losing only to Oklahoma A. & M.'s Dick Hutton, N.C.A.A. champion.

Coach Miller will take four men with him to defend his Class B title. Those making the trip are Jim Johnson, Norm Anderson, Charles Purdy and Mel James. Each of these men will enter three events except for Purdy who will enter four events. He will be the big threat for the Cornhuskers.

Weight Lifting Classes Added To P.E. Slate

P.E. 21-20 is the newest addition to the university's physical education program. Well established in about 15 other universities, the course is a body conditioner stressing exercise with weights.

Bob Higgins, a senior in Teachers college, is the present instructor. Higgins received his knowledge of the weights while attending Kemper Military Academy and serving in the Marine Corps.

The new section is given as a one hour credit and has a capacity enrollment this semester of 58 students. The class is closed this semester but will be continued next fall.

The aim of the course is to develop a symmetrical, well-proportioned physique. Those students who lack physical exercise or who do not participate in any sport are encouraged to enroll.

The course is not a weight lifting class but is supervised exercises using a graded resistance of weights. Weight lifting as a sport, however, will soon be offered.

Sooner Assistant May Try Uclans

Oklahoma university's assistant football coach, Dutch Fehring, may be headed for the University of California at Los Angeles to help with the coaching duties.

UCLA Head Coach Bert La Brucherie said last week that he had talked to Fehring and recommended his employment to the UCLA athletic board. The board will hold a meeting next Thursday.

Fehring was an all-around athlete at Purdue university from 1931 to 1934. He then was assistant coach at Purdue for nine years before entering the Navy in 1934.
