## CAFETERIA PRICES

A few loose ends in connection with The Daily Nebraskan's survey of Student Union operation remain to be incorporated into the information gleaned thus far.

Answers from schools in South Dakota, Montana, Minnesota and Nebraska indicate that cafeteria prices as established at the Campus Line compare favorably and in most instances are lower than cafeteria prices at other schools in the midwest.

A national survey covering the question of prices at school cafeterias shows that the University of Nebraska is within the lower third among colleges and universities having cafeterias. This national survey cannot be considered as a fair guide however, because excessive prices in eastern schools boost average prices to a point out of proportion to price scales at schools in ther regins.

The average price of a main dish at the Campus Line is 24.3 cents, as compared to 28.7, 24.9 and 24.1 at neighboring schools. Ten main dishes common to all cafeteria menus were used in figuring this comparison.

Further information on the price range comparison question has yet to arrive, and we will publish these findings for you as soon as they are received.

### Election Rules

Official Interpretation of Article IV, Section IV of the By-Laws of the Ju-diciary Committee of the Student Coun-

cil;
"No vote shall be solicited at the
polls or in the building in which the
election is being held during election

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"No vote shall be solicited at the polls or in the building in which the election is being held during election day."

"No vote shall be solicited" shall mean no person eligible to vote for any candidate shall, in any way, by means of the spoken or written word or any other means, be influenced at the polls or while in the building where the election is being held, to cast his or her vote for any particular candidate.

"At the polls or in the building, at any of the entrances to the building, at any of the entrances to the building, at any of the entrances to the building, and within fifty feet of the building in which the election is being held.

"The Daily Nebraska shall publish on the regular publication day prior to the election an impartial election edition containing publicity of all candidates and of all political parties."

"Impartial election edition" shall mean equal publicity for each candidate and each recognized political party without editorial and staff comment, with the same nature of information, identical style of type, pictures of the same size for all if used, and the like for each candidate and political party.

"No printed, mimeographed, typed or otherwise mechanically printed material nor any handbills in beinaff of any candidate or party shall be permitted."

"Any candidate violating these rules either in person or thru his supporters shall thereby be declared ineligible by The Judiciary. Committee upon the presentation of conclusive evidence."

This is interpreted to include the declaration of lineligibility of a party or candidate who is found goilty of attempting to disquality in any mall-clour manner his or his party to opponents.

"The Student Council has created an Election Publicity committee to approve and administrate all election campaign publicity. This committee to include the declaration of including the open of the council members only after the committee with the other three members being appointed from the Council."

direct the 120 voice choir in their presentation of Brahms' famous choral work. Dora Lee Niedenthal, soprano, and Dale Ganz, baritone, will be the group soloists.

Preceding the "Requiem," Prof. Myron Roberts will play Bach's 'Prelude in G Major," and Schumann's "Evening Song." Roberts will accompany the Singers on the organ.

Both Miss Niedenthal and Ganz have been active in music activities at the University. Miss Niedenthal is a member of University Singers, Sigma Alpha Iota, music fraternity, and a music major. She is affiliated with Gamma Phi Beta, and is a member of the YWCA cabinet and Lutheran Students Association. She is currently the soloist at Grace Lutheran church.

Ganz has appeared in four "Messiah" productions, "The Creation," "Carmen," "Pagliacci," and was active in the former men's glee clubs, madrigals, and octette. He served 52 months, and was discharged as a captain. He is an assistant voice instructor, and affiliated with Delta Upsilon,
