

Newman Club Delegates Open 3 Day Convention Here Friday

Delegates from Newman Clubs of 36 universities and colleges will meet here April 9-11 for the eighth annual convention of the Central States Province of the Newman Club Foundation.

"Meeting the Challenge of our Times" will be the theme of the Catholic student organization's meeting. States represented will be Iowa, Illinois, Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska.

Highlights Series.

The convention will highlight a series of forums and discussions of delegates to formulate the policy of the Newman Clubs of the region for the next year.

The Rev. Frank McPhillips, national Newman Club chaplain, will be the guest of the club's 940 members on this campus for the three days.

Harold J. Luchtel, president of the five-state province, is in charge of the organization of the convention. He was one of Nebraska's delegates to the same convention last year at the University of Illinois.

Opens Friday.

The program will open Friday, April 9, with registration of chaplains and students at the Cornhusker hotel and in the Union. The main address will be given at a dinner Saturday evening in the Union Ballroom by Chancellor R. G. Gustavson. His speech will be the keynote of the convention.

The program will end Sunday, April 11, with a tour of Boys Town, Nebraska. Students and delegates will meet at the Union at 1:30 for transportation.

Advance ticket sale for the two performances on April 19 of the U.S. Navy band was reported Saturday by Bill Oliver, Co-chairman of the Lincoln Junior Chamber of Commerce committee arranging the band's concerts at the University of Nebraska coliseum.

Tickets are being sold by Jaycees and by members of Lincoln Naval Reserve units. Adult tick-

ets are 50 cents for the 3:30 p. m. matinee and \$1.00 for the 8:00 p. m. performance. Children will be admitted for 25 cents at either concert. There will be no reserved seats.

The band, under the baton of Lt. Cmdr. Charles Brendler, has won critic and audience praise at every stop on its annual spring and summer tour.

Brendler enlisted in the navy when he was only 15 and in 35 years has played his way—on a clarinet—to the highest rank ever achieved by a navy musician.

Lincoln concert-goers have an opportunity to help select the program offered at the two coliseum performances. Requests may be sent to Commander Brendler, at the Naval Gun Factory, Washington, D. C., and they will be forwarded to him.

The band's repertoire includes many old favorites, so there's a good chance that requests handed to the conductor before or even during the concert, may be played as an encore.
