The Constellations, which carried 117,000 passengers along TWA's transcontinental routes since Nov. 1, 1947, flew a total of 4,337,000 miles.

WEATHER.

Midweek picnics are blessed with temperatures near seventy and southerly winds Wednesday.

COAL.

The 24-day old mine strike spread to the hard coal fields Tuesday. The move caught government officials by surprise.

Seven thousand anthracite workers walked out in the Pennsylvania field. The spread came in the face of operator's proposals for a conference to settle the dispute over pensions.

Mine-worker head, John L. Lewis made no move to accept the offer. The operators made it in accordance with Saturday's court order issued under the provisions of the Taft-Hartley act.

DIPLOMACY.

Russia and Finland signed their proposed friendship and assistance treaty in Moscow Tuesday. Details of the pact were not released.

Before it can go into effect, the treaty must be signed by Premier Mauno Pekkala and ratified by the Finnish parliament. Finns anticipate dramatic debate.

Italy is threatened with a one-hour general strike, April 12, just six days before her anxiously awaited elections. The communist controlled labor confederation ordered the strike Tuesday.

Although purportedly a protest against the murder of communist leaders in Sicily, the

strike is considered by most as in the communist election campaign a last minute show of strength.
