

Parley Craze Returns As Grid Season Opens

H. L. Weaver Trys to Explain Hybrid Vigor

Dr. H. L. Weaver of Ag college is doing research work to try to find a part of the explanation of hybrid vigor in corn. This is a question that has baffled students of genetics since the time of Mendel. Briefly the problem is this: When a relatively weak inbred plant is crossed with another of similar stature but of different parentage, the plants are sturdier and usually larger than either parent.

Dr. Weaver found some evidence in previous experiments to suggest that the explanation, or part of it, may be in the rate of cell differentiation in the growing tip. He reasoned that, if cells in the tip of the hybrid plant change to become able to carry food and water faster than did the cells of the parent, this might be the cause for their strength.

A year ago this summer, Dr. Weaver planted a plot of corn and harvested the growing tips. This summer the slides were prepared. Now he will examine them in hope of finding evidence that may cast light on the mystery of hybrid vigor.

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
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
