

NU Cagers Open Practice This Week

Coach Harry Good's cagers opened practice this week on the Coliseum courts.

Eight lettermen have returned and with a fine group of sophomores from last year's freshman squad they should give the team much needed depth. The most serious loss will be Neal Mosser, a fine floorman, by graduation.

Big Seven Conference coaches have tabbed Oklahoma as the team to beat for the title this season. On paper, the Sooners are the most well-rounded team in the Conference. Kansas State, who will be out to defend the crown which they won last year, has lost few key men and must depend on untried replacements.

Missouri will come up with a team equal to or above last years, and should also be a serious contender. League darkhorse will be the perennially tough Kansas Jayhawks. They have lost the sensational Otto Schnellbacher by graduation, and Jack Eskridge by the new eligibility rule, but they still have crafty Phog Allen at the helm, so Big Seven opponents had better watch their step.

Last call for frosh cagers is Friday. Daily practice sessions will begin Monday, Coach Good announced.

The freshman sessions this year will be divided into two groups to handle those with late classes. The first session will start at 3 o'clock, and will be out at 4:20. The second session is to be from 4:20 to 5:30. Both groups will be handled by frosh coach, Tony Sharpe.

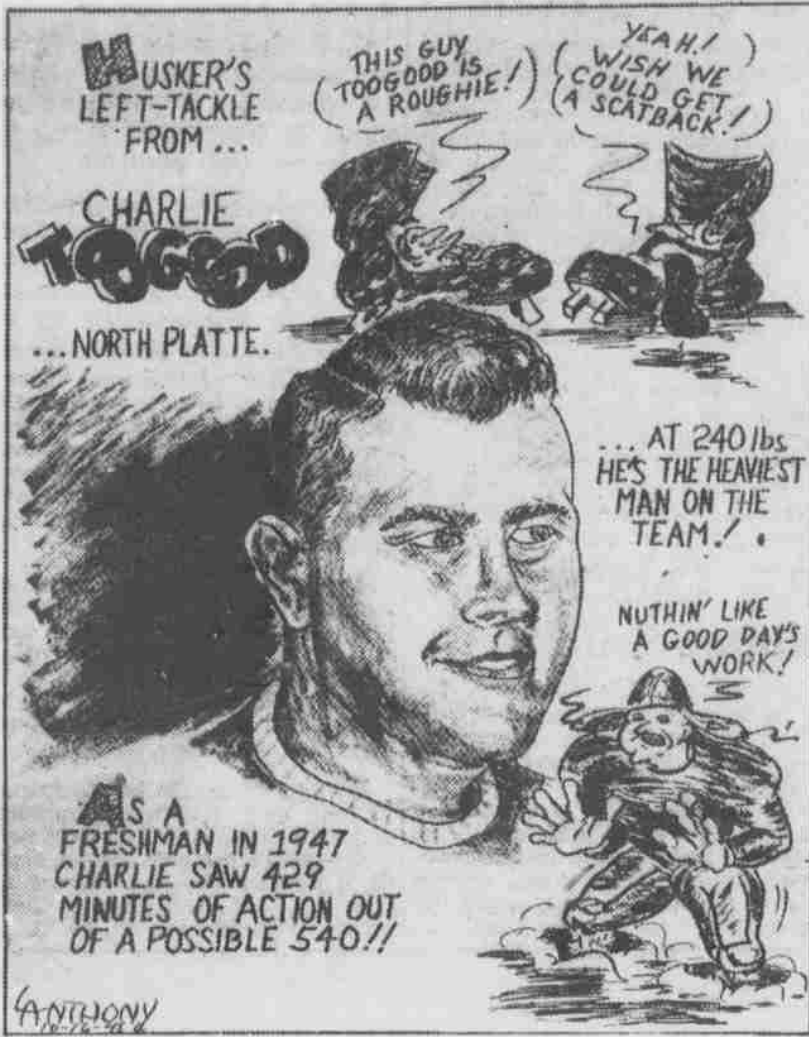

The Husker mentor said that Nebraska's younger players were hopelessly outclassed and outmanned, however they battled it out right down to the final gun. Swim Squad to Be Tough In Big Seven This Year

The Big Seven swim Conference will see a lot of the Husker tank team this season, says Coach Hollie Lepley.

The coach published a list of returning lettermen and freshman numeral-winners from last year's second-place Conference squad.

Marvin Grimm, 50 and 100-yd. freestyle Conference champ heads the list of returning men, with Gould Flagg, who placed second in diving also represented.

Fred Swihart, who swims the 220 and 440-yd. freestyle; Bill Fenton, 150-yd. backstroke; Conrad King, 220-yd. breast-stroker; Jack Campbell, 150-yd. backstroke, and Perry Branch, swimming the sprints; will be among

those comprising the nucleus of the squad.

Numeral winners that will hold places on this year's team are: Ed Craren, diving; Bill Greer and Bob Phelps, swimming the breast-stroke; Tom Harley and Ted Kanamine, in the freestyle shorts. George Hill is a freestyle distance man, while George Boomer will swim backstroke.

Last year's squad, who won five of nine meets, will feel the loss of Bruce Allen, in the sprints, Dean Porter in the distance swims and Dick Bell, who place third in diving in the tank loop.

To fill in these vacancies, Coach Lepley encourages all eligible swimmers, including freshmen, to compete in the intramural swimming tournament to be held November 8, through 12. Additional team members will be selected from those giving good performances.

"Keener competition between squad members makes for keener competition against opposition," said Mentor Lepley.

The season practice for the team begins November 8, with Marv Grimm in charge of workouts.

The season's opener will be away from home against Kansas University, January 8, and the first home meet will be Iowa State, here, February 4.

Our sophomore backs, Don Bloom and Kirk Lee, did well. It's a bit rough to drop a sophomore in for his first varsity game against a team like Notre Dame. Frank Colopy was a standout, both offensively and defensively. His punts were excellent considering the 20 mile wind. Chick Story also punted well. I believe Chick is now fully recovered from his early scrimmage hurts and should help us the rest of the way. Art Bauer was in the thick of it."

"There is a new day coming. And it will require new blood to bring the dawn of that day. We came out of the game in good physical condition. Gerald Ferguson's bloody nose was the extent of it. It's Kansas this week. We started our victory string against the Jayhawks in 1945. We hope history will start repeating for us."
