## Agency Finds Jobs for Ag College Grads

Constant demand for agriculturally trained men in soil conservation, soil science, range conservation and agricultural and civil engineering is the motivating force behind the ag placement bureau.

Carol Garey, instructor in the soils department of the Ag college, takes charge of this unique department.

Started in January of this year, the bureau has proved to be very effective in directing Ag graduates to jobs of their preference. Garey emphasizes the fact that the bureau acts only as a clearing-house between the employee and the students wishing employment—after that it is up to the student to sell himself to his prospective boss.

Of the 120 Ag graduates expected this year, about 30 have already contacted the bureau. Other interested students may contact Mr. Garey in the experiment station on Ag campus.
