Nebraska's ISA will be host to the 1949 convention of the western conference of Independent Students, according to Ben Wall, publicity chairman of the local chapter, who just returned from the 1949 convention held in Denver on Nov. 12 and 13.

At the convention, Carl Froendt of Nebraska was elected corresponding secretary of the western conference. The conference includes 37 universities and colleges as well as eleven junior colleges.

One hundred and fifty delegates attended the Denver convention. Betty Carol, Tom Myers, Sonya Sookdo and Ben Wall represented Nebraska's ISA chapter.
