Resolved: That an international code to provide for placement of surplus labor throughout the world be established; that such administrative action be taken as would be necessary to establish minimum standards of wages, child labor require-ments, housing facilities, social security benefits, health, welfare and recreational nervice; and that an international agency to enforce this code be established.

Resolved: That an international code governing the laws of copyright be drawn up and ruiffied by all the nutions of the world thereby insuring all indi-viduals of copyright protection; that said code would be applicable to all nations ratifying therefore, and would be en-forced among the parties thereinon en-tered; that said code would provide for the establishment of an international copyright office; that said code would provide for the establishment of an in-ternational reference library of interna-tional copyrighted material; that said code would provide that the initial ex-pense involved in establishing interna-tional copyright would be assessed to in-dividual nations, and that maintenance expense be provided thru individuals seek-ing international copyright be expended to the dividual nations, and that maintenance expense be provided there by aid the purpose of UNESCO by providing the world protected publication of journalis-tic liberature, music, films and other copyrighted material, thru which ideas can be exchanged on a world basis, there-by promoting world understanding. Resolved: That a commission be or-ganized to provide a board of technical experts who would serve as an advisory committee to member countries seeking technical assistance in improving their utilities, agriculture and industry; with member nations to provide the living ex-penses and operating cosits of the board of experts during the time each nation uses the services of the board. Resolved: That a commission be or-dinner will be held at 6 p.m., Wednesday, Feb. 9, in the Stu-dent Union ballroom. Resolved: That the communications com-missions in each of the member nations recommend to their governments the issue of a postage stamp with a UNESCO theme.

Resolved: That UNESCO set up a series of international radio programs, to be broadcast one hour per week, pertaining to cultural, economic and social subjects, to be carried by all major radio networks and radio stations in member nations, and that the member nations provide for trans-iations of these programs. Resolved: That from the funds of UNESCO an agency be set up whereho the member national life; and that this agency, with the advice of technical experts from the member nations, super-vise the filming of further representative material.



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
