

Out of the Hat Victories Title To Oklahoma

Oklahoma's two-point victory over Nebraska has not been the only close margin thriller turned in by the Sooners this year. They have won eight of 11 close games this season.

Early in the year Oklahoma overcame a 14-point margin with a terrific rally to tie the score and then beat the Big Niners by nine points in the overtime. Ohio State since then has turned back Se. Louis' potent team, 60-54.

Another comeback was staged by the Sooners when they trailed Iowa State seven points with nine minutes to go. They went on to tie the score and win 55-52 in the overtime.

THE SOONERS also nipped Kansas 38-36, stopped Missouri 44-40, and won the finals of the

Kansas City tourney from Kansas 53-49. They nudged Iowa State 43-42 and two nights later came from behind to edge Colorado 43-40.

Not all of the Sooners' close tilts were victories. They lost to Kansas State 45-47, to C.C.N.Y. 53-55 at Madison Square Garden and to Texas at Austin. In this game Oklahoma staged a fierce comeback only to lose by one point in the last 45 seconds of play.

After winning all their games at home by close margins the Sooners are expecting trouble on their road trip where they play four of their five remaining conference games.

A RUGGED SHOWDOWN is promised when the Sooners travel to Manhattan for a battle with Kansas State. The Aggies won the first encounter at Norman. From Manhattan the Sooners head north for games with Nebraska, Missouri, and Kansas before returning hom for the season's finale with Colorado.

NU Wrestlers Travel to Iowa For Two Meets

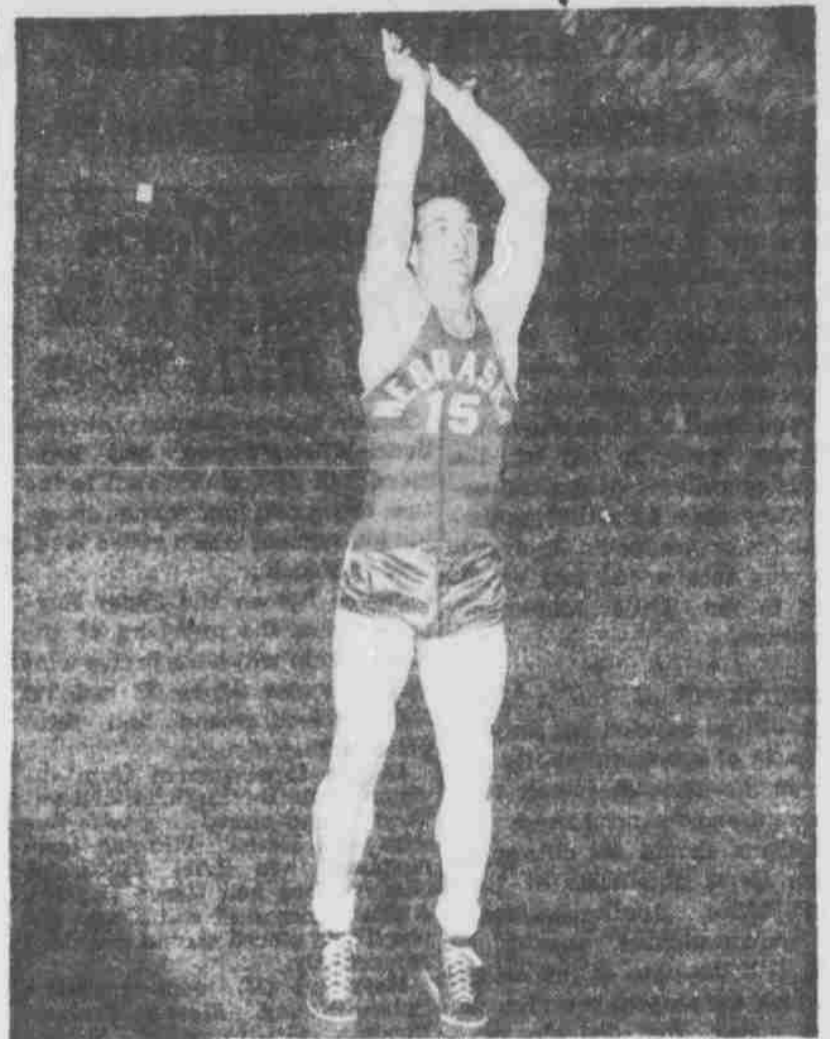

The Iowa Teachers finished in third place, nationally, last year and have an impressive record this year including a 15-9 victory over Michigan State, last year's second place team.

Cornell College, 1946 National Champion and always a strong contender for national honors, has one of its better teams this year.

NU Cagers Seek Sixth Loup Win at Iowa State Saturday

Coach Harry Good will send his cagers after loup win number six Saturday night at Ames. The Huskers will be out to repeat their previous conquest of the Cyclones earlier this season at the Coliseum.

Nebraska needs a Saturday victory and one over Missouri here Monday night to regain the conference lead.

Iowa State has been the conference "hard luck" team this season. Only Nebraska and Colorado gained decisive margins over the Iowans. Particularly close were the two contests with Oklahoma.

THE SOONERS RALLIED in the waning moments of the game at Ames to eke out a 44-43 verdict. At Norman the Sooners, after trailing at one time by ten points, came from behind again to tie in the final seconds on a desperation shot by Courty. Oklahoma won in the overtime by three points.

Pacing the Iowa State squad is fiery little Bob Peterson, 5'8 guard. Peterson ranks fifth among conference scorers with a total of 85 points in eight games. Don Fer-

guson, another "mighty mite," completes the Cyclone guard combination, the fastest in the conference.

CYCLONE COACH JOCK SUTHERLAND hopes to have the services of his ace boardman, Don Paulsen, a little longer in the second engagement against the Huskers. In the first game Paulsen ran up four fouls in the first six minutes and had to be used sparingly the rest of the way.

A tough team to beat on their home floor, the Cyclones may prove to be a big obstacle in the Huskers' path to the Big Seven title.
