Part of the meeting will be devoted to explanations by Bill Schenck, constitutions committee chairman, and Dick Schleusener, judiciary committee chairman, of revisions previously proposed to the Council, They will also tell plans formerly used for campus political organizations and explain how political parties may be established under the present constitution. As the Council constitution now stands any political party which polls 125 votes, or a major portion thereof, is guaranteed a seat on the Council.

THE POLITICAL party system functioned on the campus until 1942 but has not been revived since the war. An attempt in 1946 to establish a political party was unsuccessful.

The primary prerequisite of any campus political organization is that its membership be unre-

"Nearly any political party will receive Council approval if its membership is non-discriminatory," Schenck said.
