Fuenning, director of the Student Health Center has this to offer: Trench mouth is an infection of the gums caused by fusiform bacillus and spirochete It spreads very rapidly and can cause considerable discomfort. The gums may be reddened and later purplish and covered with a membrane. Penicillin is effective in the treatment and, if property treated, the infected mouth can be made clean in a few days.
