Nine first team Nebraska All-Staters, chosen from the three major selections of last fall, are working out daily under Hanscom and his aides.

A total of 18 different players were picked for first string honors. Three boys from this group were high school juniors in 1948.

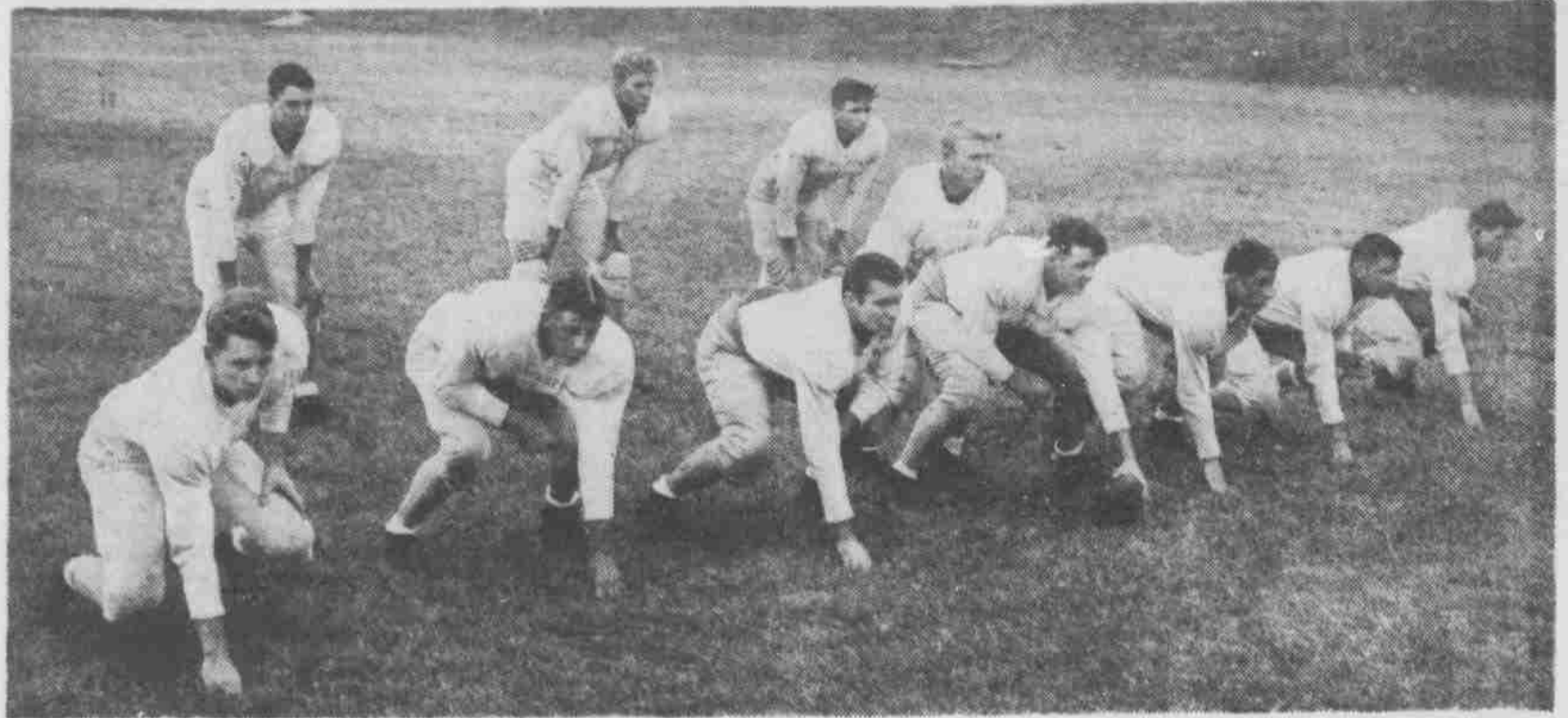

Cletus Fischer In Exhibition Tilt Wednesday

Cletus Fischer, sparkplug of Husker football teams from 1945 to 1948 was in Omaha Wednesday night.

A member of the New York Giant professional team, Fischer was on hand when the Giants met the Los Angeles Rams in Omaha's Memorial stadium.

Clete will be remember by Nebraska fans as the plucky little halfback that brightened many a dreary Saturday during the war years in Memorial stadium at Lincoln.

As a freshman under Patsy Clark in 1945, Fischer won honorable mention Big Six honors.

Plagued by injuries his junior and senior years, Clete saw limited duty. He shook off his injuries in the '47 game with U. C. L. A. and turned in one of the most outstanding defensive performances of the year.

Cletus won All-State honors in six-man football while in high school at St. Edward. Before coming to the University he coached the St. Ed. team one season. Clete's brother, Kenny, a member of Coach Bill Glassford's 1949 Cornhusker team and a teammate of Cletus last year, was a member of the St. Ed. team coached by the pro player.

Clete has four younger brothers who hope to keep the Fischer tradition alive at N. U. Rex, a sophomore in high school competed in basketball, football and track last year as a freshman. Jack, Pat and Jerry are still in grade school.
