

Editorial Cartooning Course Added to Iowa U. Curriculum

"Use the cartoon to interpret the news." That's the reason for the addition of an editorial cartooning course offered by Iowa U. school of journalism.

The course is the first of its kind to be offered by a university, according to the instructor, Richard Spencer. Artistic ability is not required for admittance to the course.

A text for the course, written by Spencer, was recently published and contains data compiled from correspondence and personal interviews with 25 of the nation's top editorial cartoonists.

The ideal prospect for such a course, according to Spencer, would be a combination of artist, journalist and social scientist. All students must produce at least one editorial a week.

Many and varied uses are found

for these cartoons. They are used in the *Daily Iowan*, the student publication, and in the *Frivol*, the campus humor magazine. Occasionally these cartoons attract the attention of editors of large papers who reprint them on their pages. The *Des Moines Register* reprinted a *Daily Iowan* cartoon in July.

National Contests

National contests provide both subject matter and audience for the "budding" cartoonists.

The subject matter is not restricted, and students may interpret the news in any way they desire. The cartoonists receive instruction and criticism in interpretative illustration such as charts, graphs and spot drawings in newspaper and magazine stories.
