

Cornhuskers Meet Wildcats Tonight

Powerful Cats Favored to Stop Home Winning Streak

Nebraska's home court basketball record of all victories and no defeats hangs by a slender thread today. The nation's number five team, namely the Wildcats from Kansas State, invade the Husker lair tonight and are favored to keep their conference record unblemished. The Wildcats have a 4-0 league record to date, good enough for first place.

From all appearances, it looks like no contest. It appears to be like any other conference game when the first place team meets the last place team. The Huskers took over that position Friday night in Ames when the Iowa State Cyclones took out their spite on the Scarlet and withered the visitors by a 67-51 count.

The Monday meeting will be the second game between the two schools this season. The Cats walloped the Cornhuskers earlier in the Kansas City tournament. There is no reason why they should not do it again.

Except for that insignificant fact that the Huskers will be playing on their home court.

It's true that the Huskers have not met any world beaters on the Coliseum mazes this season, but regardless of that, it is rough on any team to meet the Huskers at home. In fact, only one team has consistently won their share of games on the Ne-

braska floor and that team isn't Kansas State.

But to pull this upset of upsets, the Cornhuskers will have to rely upon more than the home-court jinx. They are faced with the responsibility of stopping such court-flurries as Hitch, Barrett, Stone, Gibson, Iverson, and Head.

Barrett Hurt NU

It was Ernie Barrett that killed the Cornhuskers in the KC tournament in December. It was Lew Hitch that led the Wildcat steamroller over powerful Long Island university last Wednesday. It was Jack Stone who powered the K-State over the Kansas Jayhawks. The list like this goes on and on. Any one man on the Cat squad will break your back with points if you strengthen your defense on another man.

Coach Harry Good will rely upon the scoring and floor play of his two mainstays, Bob Pierce and Jim Buchanan.

Pierce again was the big point-getter for Nebraska in their loss to Iowa State Friday night. He connected for six field goals and 6-7 free tosses for 18 markers.

Only Pierce

Bob was the only consistent hope for the Huskers, however, as the Cyclones held the rest of the Scarlet to only minor trouble. Buchanan managed only nine points, far below his game point average.

Five Indicted; Manhattan Fix

All five men arrested in the Manhattan College basketball fixing scandal, including the two co-captains of the 1949-50 Manhattan team, were indicted by the Bronx County Grand Jury of New York Friday for bribery and conspiracy.

The indictments were delivered against ex-players Jack Byrnes and Henry Poppe and against a trio described as gamblers—Cornelius Kelleher, Benjamin and Irving Schwartzberg.

All are accused of conspiracy to "throw" games last year.

Assistant District Attorney Edward Breslin announced the January Grand Jury will be held over indefinitely and "further indictments may be forthcoming."

Before handing down the indictment, the Grand Jury spent an hour questioning ex-player Poppe, who had signed a waiver of immunity.

Matmen, Gymnasts, Mermen Whip Denver, Fall to Buffs

A touring group of Cornhusker athletic teams again ran into serious trouble up Boulder, Colo., way as the University of Colorado swimming, wrestling, and gymnastics teams pummeled the Huskers very decisively.

Only in wrestling did the Nebraska men put up a good fight before losing 15-11. Harold Gilliland in the 130 lb. division, Dave Mackie in the 167 lb. class, and Herb Reese in the heavy-weight division were the only Huskers to post wins. Big Seven Champ Reese pinned Colorado's Bob Schalk for his third pin in three matches.

Gymnastics Fall

Coach Jake Geier's Husker gymnastics team fell before the Buffs, 52-84, Friday. It was a battle all the way between Colorado's ace performer, Bill Haase, and Nebraska's Al Dunavan. Haase copped three first places to roll up 26 points. Dunavan scored 20.

Although two Husker swimmers set pool and meet records and Nebraska's Eddie Carren put on a sensational show to win the diving title, Nebraska lost to Colorado's mermen, 47-57, in a dual swim meet at Boulder.

The Buffaloes won both relays and the distance events to provide the margin of victory. Ted Kanamine, ace Husker freestyle in the record time of 55.5 seconds. This replaces the old record of 56.4 set by Schmidt of Iowa State in 1949. Buele Balderson set a new record in the 200-yard backstroke in 2:31.1.

The triple loss to Colorado keeps intact the unenviable Husker record of having never won an athletic event in Boulder since the Buffs joined the Big Seven Conference two years ago. It also gives Nebraska an even split on its road trip, Denver U. having succumbed to Huskies last Thursday.

Denver Dropped

Denver gave the Huskers a scare in the wrestling meet before going down to an 18-12 defeat. Louie Caniglia, Perry Leibel, Don Rauh, and Herb Reese all won matches for Nebraska.

The Cornhusker mermen won a 49-54 victory over Denver U. swimming team in the DU pool. Ted Kanamine of the Huskers set a new DU pool record in the 50-yard freestyle. He went the distance in 24.2, beating the old mark of 24.3.

Nebraska's gymnastics squad found the going easy, winning 70 1/2-25 1/2. The Huskers won every event with Al Dunavan capturing three firsts to lead the scoring.

The Huskers ended their five-day tour of Colorado Saturday with swimming, wrestling, and gymnastic meets at Colorado State of Greeley and Wyoming university.

Sigma Alpha Epsilon, ranked eighth All-University, found its league title hopes almost completely shattered Thursday evening when it fell to an inspired Beta Sigma Psi team, 30-28. The Beta Sigs thus finished the demolition work the ATO's had begun earlier in the week, the Taus having upset the Sig Alphas by a 35-33 count on Monday.

Womans Sparkles

Virg Woamsat set off the fuse that blew the Sig Alpha's playoff hopes sky high with a tie-breaking basket in the last ten seconds of play. Woamsat's shot, a desperation over-the-head one-hander from deep in the corner, ripped through the meshes to climax a Beta Sig rally which had brought the score to 28-28 tie. Dammell and Bauer sparked the last-half Beta Sig bid and finished with 10 and 7 points, respectively. Brown and Leach were tops for the luckless Sig Alphas with 6 points each.
