

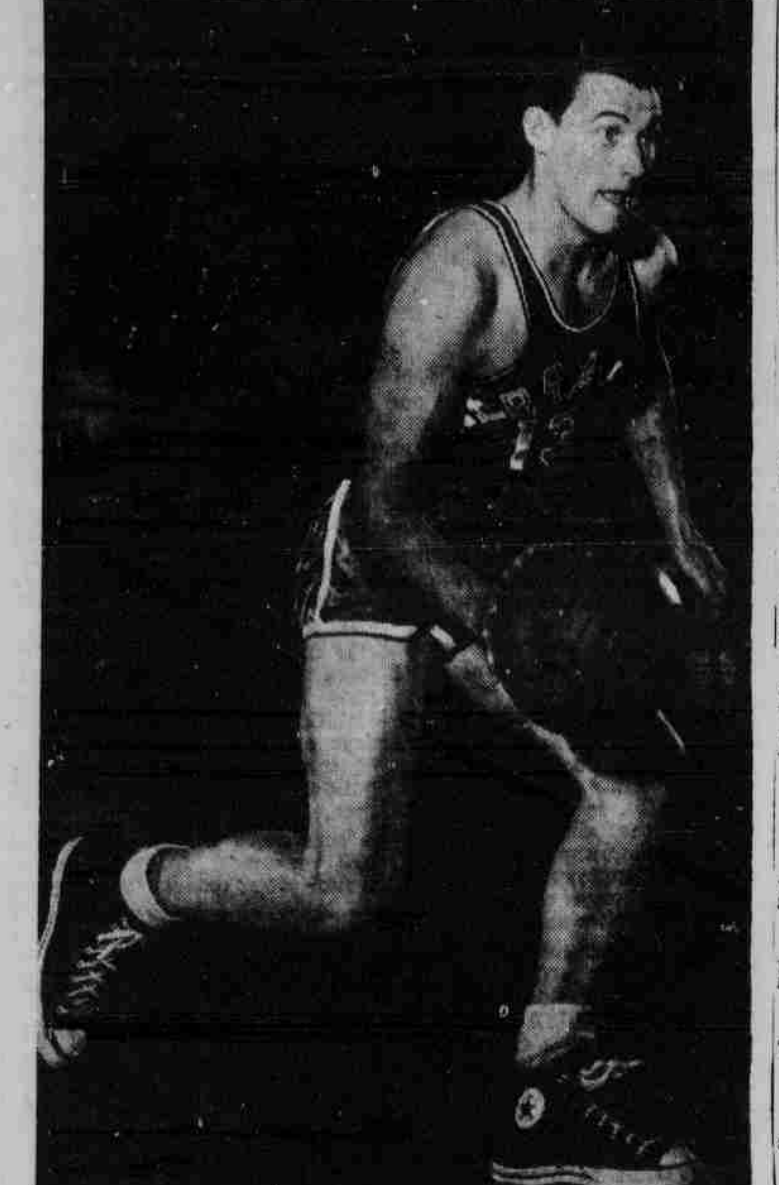
Buchanan Sets Six KC Tourney Marks

Jim (Bucky) Buchanan, Nebraska's stellar guard, all but re-wrote the record book during the pre-season Big Seven cage tournament at Kansas City.

Buchanan, who was named to the all-tourney team for the second straight year, set six new records.

- Forty-nine Big Seven basketball records were either broken or tied at the Big Seven tournament.
- It took most of a week of checking and re-checking to wind up the records for the 1951 meet—which is itself almost a record. In addition to the playing marks there were new standards set in attendance and gate receipts.
- In the second round overtime game between Iowa State and Stanford, won by the Indians, it is believed that a major college record for total points was set. At least it will serve to bring to light any greater scoring orgies.

23 Cage Quintets Unbeaten

Twenty-three intramural basketball clubs remained undefeated as play resumed Monday evening to begin 1952 competition.

Sigma Alpha Epsilon sports a 4-0 record to lead in League 1, but the high-scoring Sig Alphas are hard-pressed by Sigma Phi Epsilon. The Sig Eps have a clean slate of three wins against no defeats.

Farm House B is the charmed quintet in League 7, holding a 3-0 slate. Beta Theta is second with two wins, no losses.

In League 8, the Ag College circle, Doan Nuts are pulling away with 4 wins, no defeats, followed by University Argies and Red Guidons, 3-1 apiece.

Newman Club and Lutheran S. A. are in a 3-0 deadlock for the top spot in the church league, League 9.

Navy ROTC leads the pack in League 10 holding an undefeated record of 3-0. Dorm A Stars and Shortys are still in the running with two wins and one loss each.

Delta Sigma Pi tops League 11 with a 3-0 status. Dental Sophomores and M-Street Boys are also undefeated with two and one wins, respectively.

High on the list of boys who Coach Harry Good would strongly desire to see don scarlet and cream basketball suits next year is Robert Oakes.

Oakes is the flashy North Platte senior who has turned in some nice performances this year. Oakes teamed up with Darrell Lloyd last year to almost upset Lincoln high in the state tournament. He is probably a cinch to make many all-state teams.

Towering Jim Toft has been taking his chances in fine stride for Grand Island. The always-tough Islander attack is centered around the 6'6" senior center.

Sloan started his basketball career as a sophomore at the red and black school, a feat that few athletes can claim (Joe Good did in 1947).

Scotty Orcutt's Omaha Benson five is making its bid in the metropolis intercity league with Johnny Morris heading the fight for the green and white clad Bunnies.

Morris is just a little guy but as the proverbial goes, "dynamite often comes in small packages." Morris is faced with taking over the team leadership that looked to fall on Ron Smith's shoulders this year.

Many other names will be added to this list as the high school season progresses. Undoubtedly Seward's ace pivotman, Lyle Mueller, will get his share of the printed type; Bill Averill of Scottsbluff should be coming along also; and Ken Forbes of Northeast.

Conference Basketball Teams Face Full Week Of Activity

Big Seven action will be going full blast this Saturday as conference teams swing into full weekend slates. Only the Oklahoma Sooners will be playing a non-conference opponent.

This means that the league basketball standings will become a little clearer after Saturday's team faring. Kansas university will buck heads with the Missouri Tigers; Iowa State will tangle with the Buffs of Colorado; and the Cornhuskers will match buckets with the Kansas State quintet.

Phog Allen, Jayhawk mentor, will be attempting to keep the Kansas basketball record intact when they meet Abe Stueber's Tigers. The Kansans have taken all 11 of their cage contests thus far in the season and have been awarded the top spot in the Associated Press poll.

The Missourians are a prize example of an up and down team. Don Stauffer has taken on the scoring task for the Missourians in most of the games this year and led them to a successful runner-up position in the recent Big Seven tourney at Kansas City. Missouri's season record is six wins against five defeats.

The Nebraska Cornhuskers, surprisingly riding in a three-way first place tie, will be packing their gear for an engagement with the Wildcats of Gardner, at Manhattan.

The fighting, young Cornhuskers dropped Colorado in their first conference test while the Wildcats are still officially untried by a conference foe. The Huskers have a season record of four wins against eight losses and the K-staters have nine wins and three losses.

Oklahoma's bedraggled Sooners will battle their old inter-state rival, Oklahoma A. & M. The Cowpokes will probably be in the favorites roll against the Drake's five. The non-loop event will be staged at Hank Iba's hangout in Stillwater. This game will take place tonight.

Clyde Lovellette, baby-faced Jayhawk giant, just about started a major riot during the Kansas-Missouri fray. With four minutes remaining in the game, Lovellette allegedly stepped on the Tiger's Win Wolfing as he lay on the floor. Perhaps the Tigers will remember this little incident during their game with the sunflower boys Saturday. In any case, Big Clyde will be sure to avoid being on the floor in a prone position.
