Nation's Leading College Teams Highlight Top Games This Week

Top teams will see action throughout the country Saturday as football begins its second big week. One of the two top games in the country appears in Boulder, Colorado, where the Sooners from Oklahoma begin pursuit of their fifth straight undisputed Big Seven title against powerful Colorado University.

The Golden Buffalos from Colorado opened their season last Saturday by beating San Jose State 29-14. In this game Colorado lost the services of Woody Shelton, pint-sized wing back.

Leading sports scribes have termed this as the game that Oklahoma must win in order to repeat as Big Seven champions. Colorado has its strongest team since it entered the conference, and will be playing to avenge last year's 55-14 shellacking.

Kansas State has a worthy opponent in Cincinnati, one of the

top small-college teams in the country. Last week the Wildcats showed a spirited defense in defeating Bradley 21-7. Cincinnati opened by defeating Dayton 25-0.

Gene Rossi one of the top quarterbacks in the nation marks the Cincinnati offense, both in the nation in total offense and 17th in passing.

Kansas University also faces a tough small-school opponent in Santa Clara. The Broncos will have an offensive backfield averaging only 175 pounds, but it is speedy and veteran, and the forward wall matches speed with the backfield.

Last Saturday Santa Clara absorbed a 28-13 defeat at the hands of powerful Stanford, while KU defeated TCU eleven 3-0. If KU can keep up for this game, they should have little trouble, but several years ago the Broncos earned the name giant-killers by beating several top teams, including Oklahoma, and this could be another one of those years.

Missouri journeys to the West Coast where they play Lynn "Pappy" Waldorf's Golden Bears from California University. The Bears are laden with power this year with all-American candidate Johnny Olszewski at fullback. Last week against College of the Pacific, Olszewski broke an all-time defensive mark for Cal. The Bears defeated College of the Pacific 34-13, but experienced some little difficulty in doing it.

Bob Smith Injured; May Miss OU Game

As Coach Bill Glassford's football squad took a light workout Thursday in preparation for their Saturday game with the Webfoots of Oregon, it appeared doubtful that Bob Smith, starting offensive right halfback, would accompany the team to Portland.

Smith received a badly bruised foot in practice Tuesday night, and may not be ready to play by gametime. The hard-running sophomore back was day's practice.

Junior guard Gerald Bingham was named by Glassford as Smith's alternate. Bingham, a 220-pound, 6-2 workhorse, performed brilliantly on defense during the Cornhusker-Coyote game last week.

Coach Glassford is pleased with the progress made by his men so far this season.

"We've been showing steady improvement every week," the Husker headmaster said, "and we're in as good condition as any team I've seen."

The Oregon contest will be the second night game ever played by a Husker eleven. The only other game played under the lights by NU was at Miami

last year, when Bob Reynolds showed his brightest spark of a dismal season. Nebraska lost the game, 19-7. Coach Glassford listed his first two offensive and defensive line-ups for the Webfoot game. Some last minute changes may be necessary, however, due to the uncertainty of Smith's condition. The line-ups:

Fans will get a glimpse of last year's high school stars and future Huskers when the Nebraska frosh team hits the field.

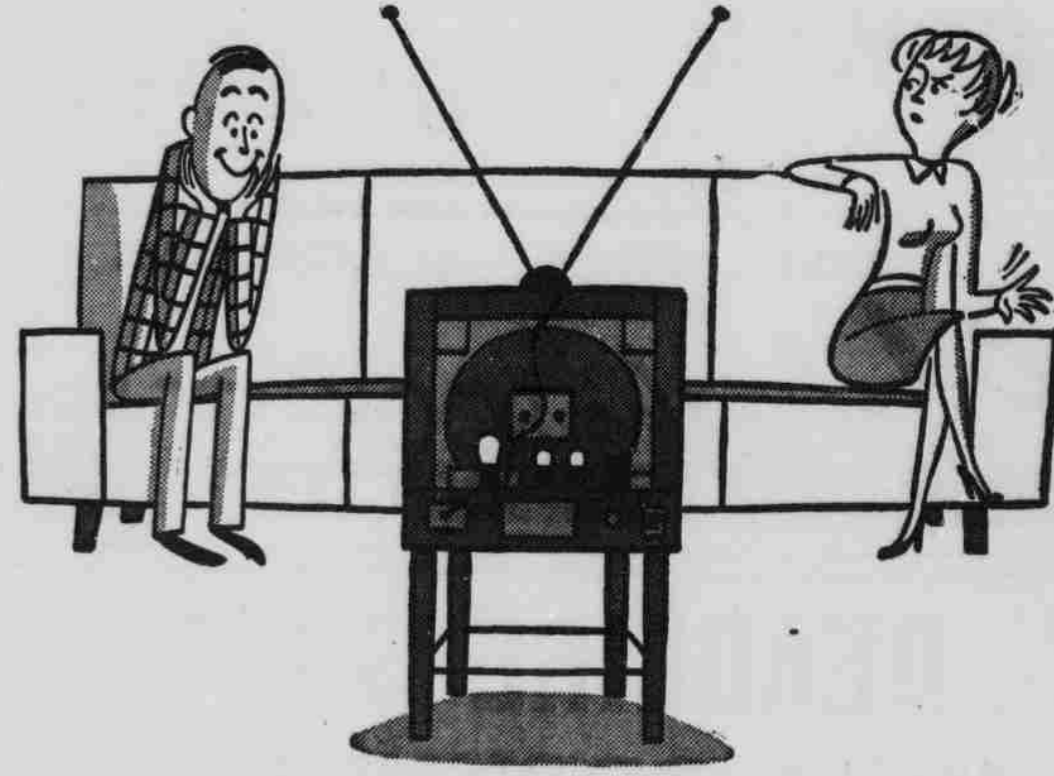
