The Cornhuskers displayed a well balanced attack against the Wildcats Tuesday night with five men hitting double figures in the scoring column. Aggression was the keynote as the Big Red's BUSHwacked the K. State clan 69-54. Nebraska only outscored their skyscraping foes by a slim 21-20 margin from the field but literally played over their heads controlling all rebounds.


