Van Dijk Praises Work Done For WUS By AUF

"Campaigning for World University Service is effortless because of the excellent job AUF is now doing," states Anthony van Dijk, representative from the University of Leyden in Holland. His main object is to inform and explain in detail where the funds AUF collects are going, he said.

Van Dijk is being sponsored by WUS as a send-off speaker for their fall campaign. Twenty-five per cent of all money collected during this drive will be donated to the WUS, Andy Smith AUF president, announced.

Van Dijk first became interested in WUS when he was living in Indonesia. He wants to help promote aid for underprivileged people and will conditions in the world today, he said.

At first, his trip to the United States was a private journalist project for the University of Bolland Press. This was to inform his people of the unfamiliar aspects of American education. Arriving in New York, he again came in contact with WUS and began this two month college tour.

World University Service is an international state relief organization based on mutual assistance of promoting relief projects in underdeveloped countries on a university level.

Its main objective is helping people to help themselves, Van Dijk said. WUS is the only national agency organized for the purpose of soliciting in American colleges for funds to aid universities. AUF.

Ag Announces Short Courses

The first session of short courses at the University Ag College will be held Oct. 31 through Nov. 2.

The short courses were planned at the request of many Nebraskans who want additional training in farm operations or home management, but who are not interested in a four-year college course.

Each short course session will be four weeks long and two courses will be available during that time.

Registration fee for each session will be \$15. Enrollment for the first session must be limited to 27 men and 20 women. Applications will be approved in the order received.

Applications should be sent to Associate Director of Resident Instruction, 206 Agricultural Hall, College of Agriculture, Lincoln.

Short course students are required to make their own arrangements for board and room. The Associate Director of Resident Instruction maintains a list of rooms that are available.

The first session courses offered for men will be selection and maintenance of farm machinery, and keeping farm records.

Women's courses offered are regarding the growing family, and home relationships and management.
