dean of home economics at Oklahoma A&M College in Stillwater. Dr. Leverton joined the University staff in 1937 to initiate and develop a program in food and nutrition. She spent one year on the staff of the Bureau of Home Economics, U.S. Department of Agriculture. In 1953 she was awarded the Borden Award by the American Home Economics Association for outstanding research in applied nutrition and was corecipient of the award in 1942.

Her efforts in nutrition have not been confined to the United States alone. One year she was a Fulbright professor in nutrition for the Philippines. She was also a U.S. delegate to the meeting of the Nutrition Committee for south and east Asia, and to the International Rice Commission in Burma. She has lectured in Cairo, Alexandria, and Istanbul under the auspices of
