

George Fisk, a pair of hardworking seniors, are the Daily Nebraskan's third and fourth nominees for the annual Athlete of the Year award.

Gardner, winner of the Henry F. Schulte trophy as the most outstanding performer in the Big Eight outdoor track meet this last weekend, is no stranger to the award winner's circle.

The mustachioed Jamaican has earned the respect of the entire nation as one of the greatest sprinters and hurdlers ever to wear the Scarlet and Cream of Huskerland.

During the indoor season, Gardner concentrated on three events, the 60-y a r d dash, and the 60-lard low and high hurdles. He came up a loser only once in any of these events. Dee Givens defeated him in the 60-yard dash finals at the Big Eight indoor championships in Kansas City.

Some of his times in these events are good enough to enter the record books as the world's best. In the 60yard dash, Gardner's best time is :06 flat, which ties the world record. In the low hurdles, his :06.7 clocking
