Academy Announces Post Doctoral Grants

Post doctoral Resident Research Associateships have been announced by the National Academy of Sciences and the National Research Council.

The associateships have been established to provide young scientists of unusual ability an opportunity for advanced training in basic research in a variety of fields.

Facilities are available in specified areas of the biological, physical and mathematical sciences as well as engineering. Research in certain areas of psychology is also available.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens and produce evidence of training in one of the listed fields equivalent to that represented by the Ph.D. or Sc.D. degree.

Participating Laboratories The associateships are worth \$5,985 to \$7,510 a year, subject to income tax.

Laboratories participating in the program are the National Bureau of Standards, Boulder, Colo., and Washington, D.C., the Naval Ordnance Laboratory, White Oak, Silver Spring, Md., and the Naval Research Laboratory in Washington, D.C.; the Navy Electronics Laboratory in San Diego, Calif.; and the U.S. Army Chemical Corps Biological Warfare Laboratories in Fort Detrick, Md., will also take part.

The Air Research and Development Command is also participating in this program at four Air Force installations.

The installations are the Air Force Cambridge Research Center in Bedford, Mass.; Air Force Missile Development Center in Alamogordo, New Mexico; Rome Air Development Center in Rome, N.Y., and Wright Air Development Center in Dayton, Ohio.

The ARDC is also sponsoring a program of Post Doctoral University Research Associateships tenable at 21 universities in the U.S.

Application Filings Applications must be filed at the Fellowship Office in Washington by Jan. 19, 1959 to be considered for 1959-60 awards. Application materials may be obtained by writing to the Fellowship Office, National Academy of Sciences-National Research Council, 2101 Constitution Ave., N.W., Washington 25, D.C.

Awards will be announced about April 1, 1959 by the participating laboratories and research centers.

The program is recorded in Paris especially for KFMQ and sent directly to the U.S.

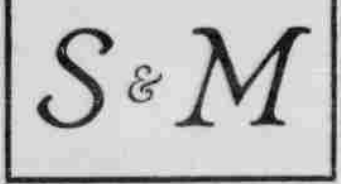
Geology Dept. To Hear Dallmus

The University department of geology will be addressed today by Karl Dallmus, a consulting geologist from Caracas, Venezuela.

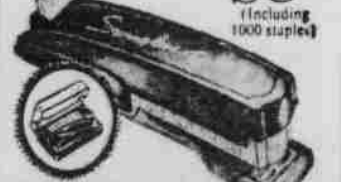

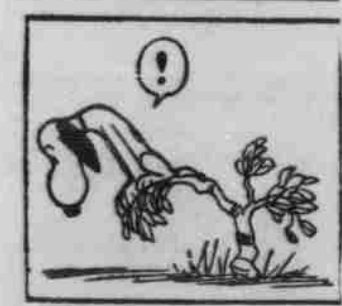
