Virtanen, Poets Edit Two Books

Poetry and the influence of Claude Bernard are the subjects for two new books published this week by the University of Nebraska Press.
 "The Year of the Green Wave," by Bruce Cutler, is the first volume to be published in the First-Book Poetry Series of University Press. Cutler's collected poems were chosen from almost 200 manuscripts submitted to the editorial board, composed of Karl Shapiro, J. E. Miller, Jr., and Bernice Slotz all of the department of English.
 Cutler is a member of the department of English at Kansas State University.
 Reino Virtanen, professor of the department of romance languages at the University, is the author of the second new book, "Claude Bernard and His Place in the History of Ideas."
 The purpose of the book is the exploration and definition of Bernard's influence in natural science, philosophy, and literature; the clarification of the philosophical bearing of his work; and the suggestion of what in his writings remains vital and pertinent for twentieth-century thought.

—Sigma Xi— Science Honorary Initiates

Sigma Xi, science honorary, initiated their new full members and associate members last evening at the groups annual banquet.

This nationally organized science honorary has, since its founding at Cornell University in 1886, honored distinguished and outstanding people in the field of research science.

Original Investigation
 It was organized to encourage original investigation in all the sciences, both pure and applied, according to Dr. Ellen Moorhead, research associate in plant pathology and past secretary of Sigma Xi.

"The society recognizes scientific spirit and acknowledges research," said Dr. Moorhead.

The national society sponsors grants for \$50 to \$750 to students and faculty members for the continuation of research into the questions of science.

In addition to the grants the national group also publishes the official quarterly, *American Scientist*, and the periodical *Science in Progress*.

On campus, Sigma Xi elects members from the undergraduates, graduates, faculty and staff members, and outstanding alums.

Two Classifications
 The new members are elected to one of the two classifications of the society — associate membership or full membership.

The undergraduates are usually elected to an associate membership on the grounds of high scholastic achievement and recommendation from their advisors based upon their work on individual research projects.

Graduates also gain membership at the associate level; but if they are nearing the completion or have their masters and have published reports on research projects, they may become eligible for full membership.

Full membership usually includes faculty members, Ph.D. candidates, and alums who have distinguished themselves in re-

search outside the University.

Percentage Varies
 "The percentage of undergraduate members to graduate and faculty members varies with the individual chapters," commented Dr. Moorhead. "Some chapters are made up of mostly graduates, like at Nebraska, while other chapters elect nearly all their members from the undergraduates."

Activities of Sigma Xi include meetings throughout the year which feature lecture programs repre-

sentative of every phase of science — medicine, anthropology, chemistry, physics, geology, and agriculture.

"The national society," said the past secretary, "selects lectures from the ranks of the countries outstanding scientists to travel to the various chapters to give these programs."

Included in its activities is at least one open house a year. This past year the group toured the medical facilities on the Omaha campus.

"In the spring both Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi have a joint meeting where the new undergraduate members are announced," said Dr. Moorhead.

The group has no limit on the number of members it can initiate each year and many of its members have also been initiated into PBK, according to the research associate.

The campus chapter contains members from all departments of science, including engineering, agriculture, and mathematics.

IBM Gives Research Computer

The University has received a \$5,000 computer power supply gift from International Business Machine, Inc.

Dr. Mark Hobson, dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture, said the unit would be used for research and experimental purposes. The gift is part of the central company's education allowance program, he said.

In addition to the power supply unit, 300 transistors also will be given to the University, according to K. W. Wilson of Rochester, Minn., IBM's University representative.

The 300 little units are newly developed, small-switching and amplifying devices that will be used to give University engineering students a chance to work with the most modern electronic equipment, Dean Hobson said.

F. E. Bruening and R. W. Gormley, both data processing representatives of the Lincoln office, presented the gifts.
