

# Huskers Lose 4th Straight As Sooners Triumph, 69-58

A frigid second half by Nebraska's cagers helped Oklahoma to a 69-58 triumph Monday night at Norman.

The loss was the fourth straight for Coach Jerry Bush's Huskers after they opened the Big Eight campaign with two consecutive wins. Nebraska is now 8-8 overall and 2-4 in the conference race with Kansas invading the Coliseum maps Saturday night.

The Huskers were as dismal during the second half as they were outstanding in the first half against the Sooners. Nebraska held a 37-36 advantage at halftime, but Coach Doyle Parrack's Oklahomans raced to a 44-37 lead before Jan Wall got the first Husker bucket with five minutes gone in the second stanza.

never trailed until Warren Fouts canned a free throw to give the Sooners the lead at 26-25.

After Morrison put Oklahoma ahead at 36-35 with 12 seconds left in the first half, Al Roots pumped in a long jump shot at the gun to send Nebraska to the dressing room with the 37-36 halftime margin.

The Huskers held Etheridge, Oklahoma's leading scorer on the season with a 13 point per game average, scoreless until he found the range from the charity stripe early in the second half. The former Lincoln High student finished with nine points.

Morrison led all scorers with 21 counters. Russell was high for the Huskers with 18 points. Roots added 14. Russell has been the top scorer for Nebraska in the past three games with 18 against Iowa State and 19 against Oklahoma State.

Monday night's contest ended a two-game road trip for Bush's cagers as they dropped a 55-47 decision to Oklahoma State Saturday night.

Bush juggled his starting lineup for the Sooner game

with Bernt Elle, making his first start, and Russell at forwards, Al Buuck at center, and Huge and Swett in the backcourt.

## Nebraska Cops Track Opener Against OSU

Nebraska's track team won its opening meet against Oklahoma State as the Huskers swept three events in downing the Cowboys, 67-55.

Six meet records were established, two meet records were tied, and one new stadium record was set.

The most exciting event of the afternoon was the pole vault when George Davies of Oklahoma State vaulted 15-1 to break the stadium record of 15-4 set by J. D. Martin of Oklahoma last year.

Davies also topped the meet record of 14-7 set by Cowboy Aubrey Dooley last year. After completing the record breaking vault, Davies tried for 15-4 1/2 but missed on all three tries.

New depth was shown in the field events as Nebraska swept the shot put. Al Wellman set a varsity and meet record as he heaved the iron ball, 52-5. Wellman was backed solidly by Larry Reiners and Leon Janovy who placed second and third respectively.

Hurdles Sweep

Nebraska swept the 60-yard high hurdles with Bill Fasano winning in :07.5 to set a meet record. Fasano shattered the old record of :07.7 held by Husker Milt Haedt and Cowboy Terry Covert. Fred Wilke and Haedt finished second and third behind Fasano.

Wilke, in leading the Huskers to the third sweep in the 60-yard lows, tied the record of :07.1 set by Bob Knaub in 1959. Fasano finished second and Knaub third.

Sammy Pegues, Oklahoma State's high jumper, set a meet record of 6-4 1/2 when he broke his own mark of 6-3 set in 1959. Vaulteur Davies of Oklahoma State tied with Husker Wilke for second in the high jump with a leap of 6-1/2.

Bill Stone of Oklahoma State, the only double winner of the meet, set a record in the 600-yard run with 1:12.7 breaking the 1:12.0 set by Joe Mullins last year. Huskers Leroy Keane and Bill Kenney finished behind Stone in that order.

Once again the sophomores came through for coach Frank Sevine as Steve Pfister won the 60-yard dash in :06.4 tying the record of Cowboy Orlando Hazley set in 1959.

The last meet record came in the last event as Oklahoma State's mile relay team of Charles Strong, Jerry Hudson, Louie Mann, and Covert was clocked in 3:29.8 breaking their own record of 3:30 set in 1959.

Nebraska finished one-two in the broad jump with Knaub leading 23-1/2 for first place and Wilke stretching 22-2 for second.

Stevens Wins

Sophomore Ray Stevens won the mile in 4:27.3. Stevens outlasted Oklahoma State's Ray Graham and John Haraughty.

In the two-mile run Haraughty came back to win over teammate Dan Metcalf. Nebraska's Paul Nielsen finished third in the long race.

Stone picked up his second win in the 880 as he was clocked in 2:00.3. Sophomore Clarence Scott and Kenny finished second and third for Nebraska.

Nebraska hosts Drake and Iowa State Saturday in a triangular meet.

## NU Swimmers Down KU; Lose Dual to Iowa State

Nebraska's swimmers continued their "win one-lose one" routine with a loss to Iowa State Friday night, and a win over Kansas Saturday afternoon at the Coliseum Pool.

It was the third weekend of dual meets that Coach Dick Klaas' tankers have split. Sandwiched among the dual meets was a win over Kansas and Kansas State in a triangular.

Records fell freely Friday night as Iowa State set three meet records and Nebraska set one in the 58-46 Cyclone win. The Cyclones opened the meet with a record-breaking performance in the 400-yd. medley relay.

The Iowa State quartet of Bud Pierce, Pete Hoetter, Paul Witherell, and Mike Elson swam the distance in 4:03.7 lowering the meet record of 4:06 set by Iowa State in 1959.

Witherell and Pierce were in on the other record-shattering swims by the Cyclones. Witherell churned the 100-yd. freestyle in :50.4 to break the record of 54.2 set by Iowa State's Ron Begg in 1960. The time also lowered the pool record of 52.6.

Pierce turned in a 2:13.8 clocking for the 200-yd. backstroke to lower the record of 2:15.8 set by Phil Braught of Iowa State in 1955.

The lone Husker with a record-setting swim was Joe Stocker in the 200-yd. breaststroke. Stocker's 2:31.6 time broke the record set by Don Benson of Nebraska at 2:31.9 in 1960.

The only Nebraska winners, in addition to Stocker,

were LaVern Bauers in the 50-yd. freestyle and Larry McClean in the 200-yd. butterfly.

One of the top performances of the evening was turned in by Cyclone diver Don Echeberger with an outstanding execution of difficult dives.

Nebraska depth helped the Huskers to a 60-39 decision over Kansas. Kansas won five events to six for the Huskers, but Nebraska picked up an abundance of second and third places to outdistance the Jayhawks.

Jay Groth was a double-winner for the Huskers in the

220 and 440-yd. freestyle events. The Nebraska sophomore edged Mike Cassidy of Kansas in both events with Husker Kuni Mihara coming in third in both races.

NU Wins Relays

The Huskers also capped both the 400-yd. medley relay and the 400-yd. freestyle relay. Nebraska's 400-yd. freestyle team was unopposed.

Other Nebraska victories came in the 200-yd. backstroke as Roger Bosveld led teammate Larry Ferrell across the line, and in diving with Branch Walton outpointing Keith Brass of Kansas.

Nebraska's next meet is Friday against Colorado State at Fort Collins. Saturday the Huskers move over to Boulder for an encounter with the Buffs.

Nebraska Coach Praises Faimon

Husker coach Mickey Sparano credited Jim Faimon as the meet's outstanding performer. Faimon, a 137-pounder, South Dakota State's Jim Kain in the 137-pound class.

Jim Raschke, Husker heavyweight, decided Frank Kurtenbach 6-0 to gain the tie for the Huskers.

Mike Nissen won his 123-pound match by forfeit to add five points to the Husker total.

The meet was plagued by draw matches as Gary Zellmer of South Dakota State and Dave Loos of Nebraska drew, 2-2, and Nebraska's Dick Van Sickle and South Dakota State's Jim Perkins drew, 0-0.

Mike Sterner was South Dakota State's bright spot when he pinned Nebraska's Dan Hoever in 5:25 of the 177-pound match.

The Sooners stretched the margin to nine points at 49-40 on a jump shot by Buddy Russell with 13:00 left in the game. Nebraska rallied to within five points at 49-44 on a jumper by Bill Bowers and two free throws by Tom Russell.

After Oklahoma's Stan Morrison and Husker Rex Swett traded jump shots, the Sooners spurred to a 60-46 lead with the Huskers going scoreless for nearly five minutes.

Wide Deficit

Oklahoma enjoyed its widest margin of the contest when Brian Etheridge hit a jumper to put the Sooners in front, 64-48. The lead varied between 11 and 15 points for the remaining minutes.

The statistics give an indication of the extremes of the two halves. Nebraska led the first-half rebounding, 22-11, but trailed in the second half, 27-13. The Huskers hit seven of eight free throws in the opening half for 87.5 per cent, but could find the range on only 11 of 21 in the final stanza for 52.4 per cent.

The first half was close all the way as Jim Hage, making his first start as a Husker opened the scoring with a set shot. The Sooners came back to tie and take the lead on a layup and free throw by Eddie Evans, a 5-9 guard.

Tom Russell gave Nebraska an 8-5 lead on a free throw and layup, and the Huskers
