

Council Adopts Motion Changing Band Seating

Band Wants To Sit Near Card Section

A motion that the University band be seated in an area adjacent to the card section during all home varsity football games was passed 17-10 by the Student Council.

The change was suggested to Dave Scholz by band members in an effort to improve school spirit and make it possible for the band to see the game, which it had not been able to do when seated on the track in front of the card section.

Unable To See
"People in the box seats behind the band were not

able to see either," said Scholz.

The bands of Iowa State, Colorado and Missouri each sit in the sections adjacent to their card sections, noted Scholz.

Band members were also dissatisfied with their seating in the north bleachers because they were "uncomfortable, cold and provided a poor view of the game."

The change in Athletic Directors prompted the request at this time, Scholz said.

Necessity Questioned
Council member Nancy Butler questioned the necessity of Council action in requesting the seating change when she discovered that the band had as yet not contacted the Athletic Department.

Scholz answered that similar motions had been passed by the Corn Cobs and Tassels, male and female pep organizations.

Commenting on the loss of seats which would otherwise be taken by paying fans, Council vice-president Don Witt said that he believed that the band would be willing to pay regular student prices for its seats.

"However, the band will interrupt the game when they move from the stadium to the field during the game for the halftime show if they sit adjacent to the card section," said Witt.

Coeds Vie In Pensacola Queen Event

All expenses of contestants during their six days as participants in the pageant will be paid by the Fiesta Association. Transportation to and from Pensacola will be the responsibility of the contestant.

Contestants will be honored at the DeLuna Coronation Ball, The Grand Fiesta Ball, and will appear in the Fiesta parades as representatives of their colleges or universities.
