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charges when the only alleged crime is carrying a concealed weapon.

Cooper said his office works under a city ordinance that allows prosecution of such charges as misdemeanors.

"We're not going to hang some kid for carrying a concealed weapon, when he's done nothing else, on a felony charge," he said.

If the arrest is made outside the city limits as a felony, the charge is often dropped by his office, Cooper said.

He said he felt the measure would be effective in reducing the numbers of people carrying concealed weapons.

Harris . . .

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Harris said 400 bills were introduced this short session, a figure he called "cumbersome." He told the group his biggest surprise as a new senator was the number of issues he never thought about and now is expected to vote on.

"My decision affects other people's lives," Harris said, which is the reason he said he does not vote on issues he has not researched.

Harris, a member of the education and public works committees, said he has introduced bills to establish provisions for educational telecommunications and to bring political action com-

"Now, we often simply won't file (a charge of carrying a concealed weapon) because we don't believe it should be a felony."

Lancaster County Deputy Attorney David Stempson, however, said the felony classification is "not at all unreasonable."

"We still have the discretion to file one charge or another," he said.

A suspect arrested for carrying a concealed weapon is very rarely brought to trial, Stempson said. A plea bargain or lesser charge is usually filed instead.

Audio and video hook-ups will provide instruction to remote parts of the state, Harris said, which he sees as the future of education in the wake of decreasing budgets.
