## Rec center low on list

The proposed \$11.9 million recreation center has a number of projects above it on a priority list at the NU Foundation, said Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs Richard Armstrong. The recently announced Lied Performing Arts Center is among them.

Armstrong said funding from the NU Foundation and other sources is crucial because the new center must be combined with an academic department to qualify for the legislative funding.

Armstrong is not hopeful that the rec center will receive funding in the near future.

"We are trying to reassess and determine other possible options for funding," he said.

Stan Campbell, director of UNL campus recreation, said recreation programs at other schools received more funding than UNL's.

"UNL is woefully lacking compared to other Big Eight schools and other schools around the country with similar enrollments," he said.

The office of Campus Recreation employs four professional staff members. This is a small number compared to other schools, he said.

"Our students are placed at a disadvantage when it comes to leisure activities," he said.

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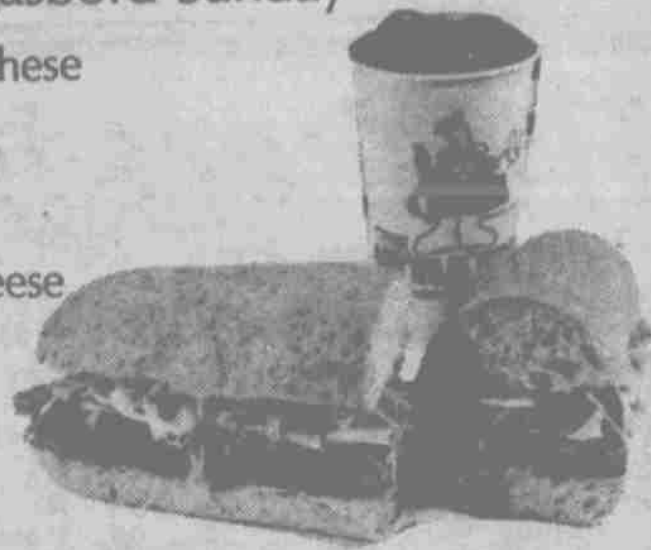
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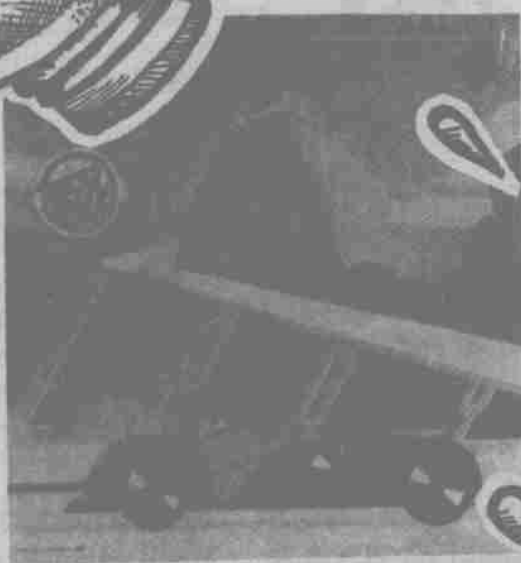
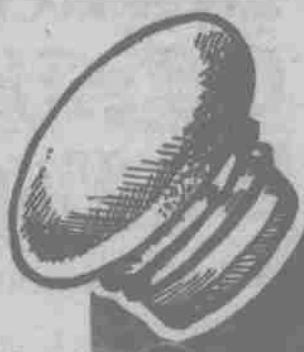
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
